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Franciscan Saints for June

- 2 St. Felix of Nicosia, Religious of I Order
- 8 Bl. Nicholas of Gèsturi, Rel., I Order

- 13 **St. Anthony of Padua,** priest, doctor, I O. Anthony was sent to Forli with some other brethren, to attend the ceremony of ordination. At the convent there the superior wanted somebody to give an address for the occasion. Everybody excused himself, saying that he was not prepared, until Anthony was finally asked to give it. When he, too, excused himself most humbly, his superior ordered him by virtue of the vow of obedience to give the sermon. Anthony began to speak in a very reserved manner; but soon holy animation seized him, and he spoke with such eloquence, learning, and unction that everybody was fairly amazed. When St. Francis was informed of the event, he gave Anthony the mission to preach all over Italy. Pope Gregory IX enrolled him among the saints in the very next year. At Padua a magnificent basilica was built in his honor, his holy relics were entombed there in 1263. From the time of his death up to the present day, countless miracles have occurred through St. Anthony's intercession, so that he is known as the Wonder-Worker. In 1946 he was also declared a Doctor of the Church.
- 16 Bls Anizet Koplin, priest and Comp. and 108 Martyrs of Nazi persecution in Poland. Cap.
- 16 **Bl. Guy (Guido) Vignotelli,** priest, 3O. (OFM)
- 17 **St. Albert Chmielowski, III Order** Saint Albert Chmielowski was born at Igoalomia, Poland on August 20, 1845 and died at Krakow, Poland on December 25, 1916. He was of a wealthy family and studied agriculture. At age 17 he was injured and lost a leg. Through his interest in politics, he came into contact with the human suffering and misery around him. He became a Franciscan Tertiary, abandoned his painting, and began working with the poorest in Krakow. In 1887 he founded the Brothers of the Third Order of Saint Francis, Servants of the Poor, known as the Albertines (named for him) or the Gray Brothers (after their rough gray habits). In 1891 he founded the women's congregation of the Order (Gray Sisters). The Albertines organized food and shelter for the poor and homeless.
- 19 **Venerable Matt Talbot,** III Order an Irish ascetic revered by many Catholics for his piety, charity and mortification of the flesh. Talbot was an unskilled laborer. Though he lived alone for most of his life, Talbot did live with his mother for a time. His life would have gone unnoticed were it not for the cords and chains discovered on his body when he died suddenly on a Dublin street in 1925. Though he has not been formally recognized as a saint, Talbot may be considered a patron of men and women struggling with alcoholism
- 22 **St. Thomas More, martyr of the III Order** Intellectuals and statesmen across Europe were stunned by More's execution by King Henry VIII. Erasmus saluted him as one "whose soul was more pure than any snow, whose genius was such that England never had and never again will have its like". There was a more controversial side to Two centuries later Jonathan Swift said More was "the person of the greatest virtue this kingdom ever produced", a sentiment with which Samuel Johnson agreed. Historian Hugh Trevor-Roper said in 1977 that More was "the first great Englishman whom we feel that we know, the most saintly of humanists, the most human of saints, the universal man of our cool northern renaissance.
- 22. St. John Fisher. Fisher was executed by order of King Henry VIII of England during the English Reformation for refusing to accept the king as Supreme Head of the Church of England and for upholding the Catholic Church's doctrine of papal primacy. He shares his feast day with St. Thomas More
- 23 **St. Joseph Cafasso, III Order** Even as a young man, Joseph loved to attend Mass and was known for his humility and fervor in prayer. After his ordination he was assigned to a seminary in Turin. There he worked especially against the spirit of Jansenism, an excessive preoccupation with sin and damnation. Joseph used the works of St. Francis de Sales and St. Alphonsus Liguori to moderate the rigorism popular at the seminary. Joseph recommended membership in the Secular Franciscan Order to priests. He urged devotion to the Blessed Sacrament and encouraged daily Communion.
- 30 **Bl. Raymond Lull, martyr of III Order.** Despite his marriage and two children, he led a dissolute life, but changed his lifestyle in 1263 when he had a vision of Christ while writing to a woman with whom he was having an affair, followed by five more visions. After 2 pilgrimages, he became a Franciscan tertiary, provided for his family, gave the rest of his wealth to the poor, and determined to devote the rest of his life to converting the Moslems.




Our Library

A Message by Richard Rohr, OFM

I am doing a short study of the Letter to the Ephesians on this lovely Sunday morning, and have had time to absorb some of its amazing insights. Paul, or whoever wrote it, says that the exact meaning of the cross is that "Jesus destroyed in his own person the hostility" between groups (In fact, he repeats it twice in both 2:14 and 2:16) Jesus did not take sides with his Jewish religion against the pagans, but instead he did a most amazing thing, which we have yet to comprehend. The author says that he destroyed the hostility -

"THAT WAS CAUSED BY THE RULES AND DECREES OF THE LAW".

In other words, the very identification of his group (or any group) with its own customs and practices is what justifies their hostility toward another group, and maintains their own superiority system—which is always violent in maintaining itself.

Is this not the core historical problem that continues to justify most hostility to this day? My group versus your group thinking? We do it this way and you do it the wrong way? Think of the genocides of the last century, which were usually in Christian based cultures, to realize how we have missed the message. Ephesians says that Jesus "killed" or "destroyed" the very ground of this hostility by himself being killed "under the law" (with the blessing of both religion and state), and thus revealing the limitations, blindness, and often complicity in evil of what are usually nothing more than cultural customs passing for divine law. Our "sacred order" is usually maintained at someone else's expense. This is so much of a surprise that most of us still refuse to be surprised—and also disappointed in our capacity for missing the profound revelation from the cross of Jesus. Ephesians goes on to say that Jesus is trying to "create one single New Humanity" (2:15). We are still waiting for this new single humanity. It could still change history, and it eventually will, but probably we have to hit bottom first—and see how our sacralized beliefs and customs are themselves much of the problem.
