Father Antonio Durante from Monterosso, a Capuchin friar also had the chance to observe how Padre Pio read his thoughts on one occasion. One day while walking with the Padre in front of the friary, he noticed that Padre was the object of much affection and devotion from the people. Seeing this, Fr. Durante said to himself: "How can this man resist the temptation of vanity and of feeling pleased with himself'? He had just finished saying this to himself when the Saint turned towards him, smiled and softly said to him: "See how much glory is being given to God!" (Testimony of Fr. ## Happy Feast Day of St. Clare of Assisi

"He, Christ, is the splendor of eternal glory, "The brightness of eternal light, and the mirror without cloud." Behold, I say, the birth of this mirror. Behold Christ's poverty even as he was laid in the manger and wrapped in swaddling clothes. What wondrous humility, what marvelous poverty! The King of angels, the Lord of heaven and earth resting in a manger! Look more deeply into the mirror and meditate on his humility, or simply on his poverty. Behold the many labors and sufferings he endured to redeem the human race. Then, in the depths of this very mirror, ponder his unspeakable love which caused him to suffer on the wood of the cross and to endure the most shameful kind of death. The mirror himself, from his position on the cross, warned passers-by to weigh carefully this act, as he said: "All of you who pass by this way, behold and see if there is any sorrow like mine." Let us answer his cries and lamentations with one voice and one spirit: "I will be mindful and remember, and my soul will be consumed within me." – from a letter to Blessed Agnes of Prague by Saint Clare of Assisi

# Refugees: An opportunity to grow together Joint ecumenical statement for World Refugee Day 2017

The Christian Bible tells the story of two men, Peter and Cornelius, utterly divided by religious belief and culture, who in encountering each other discovered a truth about God's common will for them that neither had previously grasped. They learnt that the Holy Spirit brings down walls and unites those who might think that they have nothing in common.

All around the world, women, men, and children are forced by violence, persecution, natural and human-caused disasters, famine, and other factors, to leave their homelands. Their desire to escape suffering is stronger than the barriers erected to block their way. The opposition by some countries to the migration of forcibly displaced people will not keep those who undergo unbearable suffering from leaving their homes. Wealthy countries cannot evade their responsibility for the wounds inflicted on our planet — environmental disasters, the arms trade, developmental inequality — that drive forced migration and human trafficking.

While it is true that the arrival of migrants in more developed countries can present real and significant challenges, it can also be an opportunity for openness and change. Pope Francis poses this question to us: "How can we experience these changes not as obstacles to genuine development, but rather as opportunities for genuine human, social and spiritual growth?" Societies that find the courage and the vision to go beyond the fear of foreigners and migrants soon discover the riches that migrants bring with them, and always have. ## ST. LOUIS IX OF FRANCE, OFS



Reigning from 1226 to 1270, Louis IX showed how a saint would act on the throne of France. He was a lovable personality, a kind husband, a father of eleven children, and at the same time a strict ascetic.

To an energetic and prudent rule Louis added love and zeal for the practice of piety and the reception of the holy sacraments. He was brave in battle, polished at feasts, and addicted to fasting and mortification. His politics were grounded upon strict justice, unshatterable fidelity, and untiring effort toward peace. Nevertheless, his was not a weakly rule but one that left its impress upon following generations. He was a great friend of religious Orders, a generous benefactor of the Church.

The Breviary says of him: "He had already been king for twenty years when he fell victim to a severe illness. That afforded the occasion for making a vow to undertake a

crusade for the liberation of the Holy Land. Immediately upon recovery he received the crusader's cross from the hand of the bishop of Paris, and, followed by an immense army, he crossed the sea in 1248. On the field of battle Louis routed the Saracens; yet when the plague had taken large numbers of his soldiery, he was attacked and taken captive (1250). The king was forced to make peace with the Saracens; upon the payment of a huge ransom, he and his army were again set at liberty." While on a second crusade he died of the plague, with these words from the psalm upon his lips: "I will enter Thy house; I will worship in Thy holy temple and sing praises to Thy Name!" (Ps. 5).

It was his mother's supreme desire that her son should become a kind, pious and just ruler. She was wont to say to him: "Never forget that sin is the only great evil in the world. No mother could love her son more than I love you. But I would rather see you lying dead at my feet than know that you had offended God by one mortal sin." These words remained indelibly impressed upon his mind.

St. Louis was a member of the Third Order of St. Francis and so is included in the family of Franciscan saints.

**Note**: Around 1257, Robert de Sorbon, a priest and man of great learning, told his friend, King Louis, about his plans to build a college for poor students in Paris. Louis liked the idea, obtained the approval of Pope Clement IV, and gave Robert the money to endow the project. Before long, the institute, known as the Sorbonne, served as the theological division of the University of Paris. Men such as St. Bonaventure, St. Albert the Great, and St. Thomas Aquinas taught there and their work continues to influence Church teachings today. He often had the three to dinner. Can you imagine the Theological discussions? They didn't always agree.

## O Breath of Life, Sail My Soul - Respirito Divina

Life is bookended by a first and last breath. From a baby's first cry to a last dying sigh, each life is marked with a certain number of life giving breaths. Each breath is a gift from Creator Abba..

How would life be if every breath were revered as the breath of the Creator?

It's one of those things that you don't think about until you have to. I remember first contemplating breath as a young nurse. Respirations are one of the vital signs that clinicians routinely note and assess. When a nurse go into a patient's room to take vital signs, everyone quiets. As I counted respiratory rates in the silence I would feel a reverence for every respiration as the will of God, and as God's will, His very breath.

My spirituality began to bloom and I started to practice reverencing the breaths that I took as God's spirit blowing life into my mortal body. Though this incorporation of breathing with mediation and prayer is not an original idea, it has become a soul-filling sustenance to my being in my work, my play, my rest, my mediation and my prayer. I call it Respirito Divina.

I find that as I practice Respirito after Lectio Divina and throughout my day, the graces lead me to deeper contemplation and fruitful resolution and action. In my Gospel reading I ask the Spirit to strike me with the words or verses that I am to hear, and I practice breathing them in and out as cadence while I go about my daily activities. Sometimes other meditations find their way in. I was recently hiking a steep trail and my Respirito was a combination of Gospel verse and a St Francis quote:

Breathe in: "Lord, I am not worthy,

Breathe out: that you should enter under my roof."

Breathe in: "I am what I am in the site of God.

Breathe out: Nothing more, nothing less."

Lynn Oeser, OFS who is our musical director, shared that "this past winter, weather and holiday conflicts caused our Fraternity celebration of the Rite of Extraction to be postponed from the Christmas season to a later date. Our assistant minister at the time asked me to select a hymn to replace the Christmas Carol. I prayed for guidance and pondered anew that the Rite itself is an invocation calling upon the Holy Spirit to "send" the perfect verse, saint and virtue to each fraternity member. Through my search a hymn popped up that I had not heard before. The song I heard was "O Breathe on Me, O Breath of God" by Edwin Hatch.

The words go along to a familiar tune, and they really speak to the Spirit of the Rite from a Triune dwelling place and of life giving breath. I called the assistant minister with the selection and he could not recall hearing it before either, but he was agreeable to using it. The very next day, I received in the mail my first copy of <u>Tau USA</u> and was stunned by the cover.

My hands shook as I read the words:

"O Breath of God, Unite us in action!"

It was the 2017 NAFRA theme. When I got to page one, I fell to my knees. The first article by National Minister, Jan Parker OFS, in reflecting on the theme recanted lyrics from the hymn that found me through the Holy Spirit:

"O Breathe on me. O Breath of God

Fill me with life anew,

That I would love the things you love,

And do what you would do."

Still on my knees, with my heart beating at warp speed, I called Frank, our vice minister, to share my excitement and awe. With humble gratitude for unbounded love, call, and direction, my cup runneth over!
