HIs Last Word Was "Maria"

LOS ANGELES, CA (Catholic Online) - St. Padre Pio passed away in 1968 at 81-years-old. His final words were, "I see two mothers," then, "Maria!" He was buried on September 26 in a crypt of the Church of Our Lady of Grace. His relics were collected forty years after his death and kept in Italy. The relics toured in the United States last year. There were two tours, one from May 6 and end May 21, while the second was from September 17 through October 1.

My Reflections on the "Yes" We Promised at Profession?

Our Secular Franciscan Rule 7 states: "United by their vocation as 'brothers and sisters of penance' and motivated by the dynamic power of the gospel, let them conform their thoughts and deeds to those of Christ by means of that radical interior change which the gospel calls 'conversion.' Human frailty makes it necessary that this conversion be carried out daily." With the grace of God, are you and I daily responding to the will of God according to the "yes" we promised at our Profession?

We have many questions to ask ourselves. Are we really following the example of St. Francis of Assisi who made Christ the inspiration and the center of his life with God and people? Are we reading the gospel and putting it to action in our secular lives? Let us examine our Secular Franciscan lives.

Do we encounter the living and active person of Christ in our brothers and sisters, whether they are black or white, Christian or Jew, Catholic or Muslim, male or female, citizen or immigrant, etc.? Do we generously sacrifice our own happiness, well-being and peace for the good of our neighbors? Or are we full of pride and self-centeredness?

Are we hampered by sloth, and ready to occupy ourselves eagerly with any unimportant trifle? Francis began withdrawing to caves and isolated places outside of Assisi for prayer and reflection. Do we have our own holy place for prayer and contemplation?

Do we say a liturgical prayer in one of the forms proposed by the Church, reliving the mysteries of the life of Christ and praying with Him? Do we protect the name of the Virgin Mary, who is being insulted and blasphemed in our present-day society? She was embraced by Francis with indescribable love and declared the protectress and advocate of our family.

Are we wearing the TAU daily to show who we are? Jesus said ³"Whoever acknowledges me before others, I will also acknowledge before my Father in heaven." (Matthew 10:32)

Do we practice the spirit of poverty by making ourselves get along with what we can afford or less? Thus, practicing a proper spirit of detachment from temporal goods by simplifying our own material needs? Do we buy things not because we needed them but because we wanted them?

Do we brag about our gifts which come from God who deserves to get the credit? Francis said, "We have no right to glory in ourselves because of any extraordinary gifts, since these do not belong to us but God. But, we may glory in the crosses, infirmities, and tribulations because these are our own."

Do we gripe, and find pleasure in the unhappiness of our enemies? Do we participate in talk about frivolous matters and things which corrupt the spirit; but gives us pleasure? Are we wearily curious about new fads, about civic affairs and political events which shows how selfish or unkind we can be to others? Who is the leper in our lives? Can we find the courage to "embrace" that person as a child of God?

A sense of community needs to make us joyful. However, do we attend monthly gatherings regularly or do we easily find an excuse not to be there? Do we participate in the apostolates of the fraternity as much as possible? Do we volunteer to give rides or visit the sick of our fraternity? Do we pray for our sick and deceased members when at Mass? How creditable is our contribution to the common fund?

The Catechism of the Catholic Church gives us guidance for daily conversion. In paragraph 1435, it states: "Conversion is accomplished in daily life by gestures of reconciliation, concern for the poor, the exercise and defense of justice and right, by the admission of faults to one's brethren, fraternal correction, revision of life, examination of conscience, spiritual direction, acceptance of suffering, endurance of persecution for the sake of righteousness. Taking up one's cross each day and following Jesus is the surest way of penance." (cf. Luke 9:23). In this list, there are numerous ways of practicing acts of penance leading to daily conversion.

Do we do these things in all humility, for without humility, there is no holiness- and without holiness, there is no heaven. These are all things to consider as we reexamine our lives and remember the "yes" we promised God at our profession. By an Old Secular Franciscan.

We ask this through Christ, our Lord. Amen


August Ongoing Formation

September - Month of Our lady of the Seven Sorrows

- 1. Bl Joachim de Albocacer, Priest, Capuchin religious, martyr 1936
- 2. Bl. Martyrs de Carmes, d. 1792
- 3. St. Pius X, Pope, Franciscan Third Order Secular, d. 1914 For 9 years he was pastor in Salzano, Italy. It was during this period that he joined the Third Order of St Francis and established 2 fraternities of Tertiaries. Henceforth he strove in his words and in his writings, especially by Franciscan simplicity and frugal standards of life, to emulate the ideals of the seraphic saint.
- 4. St. Rose of Viterbo, Virgin, Franciscan Third Order Secular, d. 1252 Plenary Indulgence for cordbearers
- 5. Bl. Gentil de Matelica, Priest, religious of the Franciscan 1st Order, martyr 1340
- 6. Bl Liberat de Laure, Priest, religious of the Franciscan 1st Order, d. 1258
- 7. Bl. Eugenie Picco, Virgin, religious of the Third-Order Regular [living in community, under a Rule], d. 1921

8. Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary

- 9. Bl. Seraphique Sforza, Virgin, of the Franciscan 2nd-Order; a "Poor Clare" sister, d. 1478
- 10. Bl. Martyrs of Japan, religious of the Franciscan 1st Order and Franciscan Third Order Seculars, d. 1622-1632
- 11. Bl. Bonaventure de Barcelone, lay brother, religious of the Franciscan 1st Order, d. 1684
- **12. Feast of the Name of Holy Mary -** Francis loved the Mother of Jesus with a love that cannot be described, because she made Him our brother.
- 13. Bl. Apollinaire Franco, Priest, religious of the Franciscan 1st Order, martyr 1622
- 14. Exaltation of the Holy Cross
- 15. **Feast of Our Lady of the Seven Sorrows** The swords in Mary's heart represent her grievous sorrows. Known as the Seven Dolors of Mary, these sorrows are:
 - 1. The prophecy of Simeon (Luke 2:25-35)
 - 2. The flight into Egypt (Matthew 2:13-15)
 - 3. Loss of the Child Jesus for three days (Luke 2:41-50)
 - 4. Mary meets Jesus on his way to Calvary (Luke 23:27-31; John 19:17)
 - 5. Crucifixion and Death of Jesus (John 19:25-30)
 - 6. The body of Jesus being taken from the Cross (Psalm 130; Luke 23:50-54; John 19:31-37)
 - 7. The burial of Jesus (Isaiah 53:8; Luke 23:50-56; John 19:38-42; Mark 15:40-47)
- 16. Bl. Roland de Medicis, Confessor, Franciscan Third Order Secular, d. 1386
- 17. Feast of the Stigmatization of St. Francis of Assisi
- 18. St. Joseph de Cupertino, Priest, Conventual, d. 1664
- 19. Bl. Louis Alleman, Bishop, Franciscan Third Order Secular, d. 1450
- 20. St. Francois-Marie de Camporosso, lay brother, Capuchin religious, d. 1866
- 21. Bl. Elizabeth Amerina, Virgin, Franciscan Third Order Secular, d. 1498

St. Pio of Peitrelcina, Priest, Capuchin religious, There are saints who have been known for healing; there are saints who could "read" souls; there are saints who were known for levitation; there were saints who bore the stigmata, or were seen in apparition, or who had the "odor of sanctity." There are saints who could understand languages they didn't know. But Padre Pio of Pietrelcina, who died on September 23, 1968, had all these charisms, and more. In fact, not since St. Francis of Assisi has there been such a miracle-worker. *Posted in Saints & Blessed*


Ideas for Celebrating the Feast of St. Padre Pio September 17 - By Lacy,
