Elizabeth appreciated her dignity from childhood on. She found her sweetest delight in being united with God by prayer and pious practices, and her favorite occupation was to serve God in His poor and sick members. Elizabeth was a princess of the Kingdom of Hungary and a greatly venerated Catholic saint who was an early member of the Third Order of St. Francis, by which she is honored as its patroness. Elizabeth was married at the age of 14, and widowed at 20. After her husband's death she sent her children to be with relatives and used her dowry to build a hospital where she herself and her servants served the sick. She became a symbol of Christian charity after her death at the age of 24 and was quickly canonized. From Catholic Online

Padre Pio and the Souls in Purgatory


Padre Pio had a very particular relationship with the Holy Souls; indeed they were his frequent visitors - so much so that at one time he said: "I see so many souls from Purgatory that they don't frighten me any more." And on another occasion when questioned further on the matter, he replied: "More souls of the dead than of the living climb this mountain to attend my Masses and seek my prayers."

Padre Pio was one who offered his pains, prayers and sufferings for the release of those in a state of purification, and those souls never ceased to thank him for this. We must be truly grateful to Padre Pio for lifting the veil which separates this world from the next for a few instants and thereby helping us to understand and remember their real presence within the Church.

During his early years in San Giovanni Rotondo, he was in charge of the young students for the priesthood. He often spoke to them of the pains and sufferings of the souls in Purgatory and of our duty to help them with our prayers, mortifications, and other meritorious works. To encourage prayers and good works for the Holy Souls, Padre Pio would often relate to the seminarians his own personal experiences with deceased souls, telling them that these souls came to him to seek his prayers.

Indeed, as we know, nothing out of the ordinary had happened at all, for souls of the dead were frequent visitors to him during the

fifty-two years he spent at San Giovanni Rotondo.



St. Gertrude's Prayer

The Prayer of St. Gertrude, below, is one of the most famous of the prayers for souls in purgatory. St. Gertrude the Great was a Benedictine nun and mystic who lived in the 13th century. According to tradition, our Lord promised her that 1000 souls would be released from purgatory each time it is said devoutly.

The Beatitudes and the Gifts of the Holy Spirit

St. John Paul II in his encyclical on the Vocation and Mission of the lay faithful in the Church and in the World, wrote, "Life according to the Spirit, whose fruit is holiness, stirs up every baptized person and requires each to follow and imitate Jesus Christ, in embracing the Beatitudes, in listening and meditating on the Word of God, in conscious and active participation in the liturgical and sacramental life of the Church, in personal prayer, in family or in community, in the hunger and thirst for justice, in the practice of the commandment of love in all circumstances of life and service to the brethren, especially the least, the poor and the suffering."

The Ignatius Catholic Study Bible of the Gospel of Matthew notes that the beatitudes (Matthew 5:3-12) follow distinct pattern and logic. Each blessing builds upon the one before it; the beatitude of spiritual poverty is the foundation for all of them. Morally the first seven beatitudes correspond to the seven gifts of the Holy Spirit. According to this arrangement, the eighth beatitude summarizes the first seven.

- 1.The "poor is spirit" exercise the fear of the Lord, a gift of reverence for God that awakens the soul to its weaknesses and foster a childlike fear of the Father. With a humble spirit, they live inwardly detached from earthly goods.
- 2.Those who "mourn" exercise knowledge, the gift that imparts a correct evaluation of created things and their relative value before God. They recognize the injustices of this world and grieve over their sins.
- 3.The "meek" exercise <u>piety</u>, the gift of intimate love for God that moves the soul to worship. It protects against the hardening of one's heart in the midst of trials. Meekness is not weakness but humility and faith in God.
- 4. Those who "hunger and thirst for righteousness" exercise <u>fortitude</u>, the gift of firm resolution to pursue holiness despite obstacles. Thus, the meek are not satisfied with being on earth but long for a heavenly inheritance.
- 5.The "merciful" exercise <u>counsel</u>, the gift that assists decision making and helps to guard against carelessness; as an interior guide, it assists one to counsel others and to extend compassion to them. They imitate God by forgiving their neighbor and seek to remedy injustices in the world.
- 6.The "pure in heart" exercise <u>understanding</u>, the gift of insight into the mysteries of faith. It is not mere intellectual understanding but the spiritual awareness of the heart. The inwardly pure behold God in the simplicity of faith. They will see Him face to face in heaven.
- 7.The "peacemakers" exercise <u>wisdom</u>, the gift of contemplative reflection on the love for divine things. It enables one to assess the world by revealed truths and instills peace in the soul. They seek to extend this gift to others by advancing the gospel.
- 8.The peacemakers who <u>spread the gospel</u> inevitably encounter persecution. They suffer maltreatment for their unwavering fidelity to God and their denunciation of personal and social evil.

Jesus tells us what love is through the beatitudes. He teaches transformation of the inner person. This transformation takes place with the gifts of the Holy Spirit.

This transformation of the Beatitudes have an eschatological meaning, that is, we are promised salvation - not in this world, but in the next. And, scholars agree that the beatitudes give us a portrayal of Jesus, thus a way to imitate Christ. They emphasize what we sense in our Secular Franciscan rules. Imitating Christ is what St. Francis really wanted and this is what all Christians should desire also. *By the Editor*

The Transitus opened with a procession into the church led by Fr. Steve Patti, OFM, Fr. Steve Kluge, OFM and Fr. Jim Sabak, OFM followed by members of our Padre Pio fraternity.

The altar steps were adorned with a life size cross and a Franciscan habit and a set of candles that fraternity members Joan Monti, OFS and Dave Shick, OFS lighted.

Sharon Winzeler, OFS, read the introduction by Brother Elias followed by a narration of Francis's death by Victoria Romero, OFS, and Tim Hetzel, Jennifer Fiduccia led in the singing of the responsorial psalm. Deb Royals-Mizerk read from the gospel of John.

Father Jim gave a sermon on the life of St. Francis. Music director Jim Wahl sang the hymn *O Sanctissima* in Latin and also provided the organ music.

After, there was a prayer by Father Jim. Candles were lit from the pascal candle and the participants processed out, singing *Jesus Remember Me When I Come into Your Kingdom* to the church prayer garden where Father Jim gave us the blessing of St. Francis.

Then the permanently professed went back into church and renewed their Secular Franciscan promises.
