





Did you know?

Our National Fraternity tells us that our local fraternity is the basic unit of the Secular Franciscan Order (OFS). It has a special purpose which is defined by the OFS legislation and a unique identity called a "juridical personality" in the Church. Did you know, we have a history? History is the interpretation of the significance of our past. Part of our history is lost, which is sad. Without the knowledge of our history and origin, our community is like a tree without roots. Yes, we do have roots. A member of our community, Ida Irwin, OFS has gathered for us from limited records, letters, the fraternity scrapbooks and by word of mouth from Marge Zombec, OFS, Joanne Jacovec, OFS, and the late Vincent McKone, OFS our history. This was accomplished in August of 2015. Each month, this column in our newsletter will attempt to remind us of our roots. We will reflect on a part of the history of our local fraternity, "the basic unit of the Secular Franciscan Order." Michael Crichton, an American author, brilliantly said, "If we don't know our history, then we don't know anything." He added, "Then, you are a leaf that doesn't know it is part of a tree."

First, we ask ourselves what Francis expected of us penitents- a life consisting of following the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ with selfcontrol, participating in the Eucharist regularly, praying and doing good works. He wrote, "O how happy and blessed are these men and women while they do such things and persevere in doing them because the Spirit of the Lord will rest upon them and make It's home and dwelling place among them and they are children of the heavenly Father Whose works, they do and they are spouses, brothers and mothers of our Lord Jesus Christ." Francis wanted our Franciscan family to be unburdened in relationship with each other and the Trinity (the Heavenly family). We do this in fraternity. Starting this November, we remember and pray for our deceased members.

"Help Me Rebuild and Reform our Church"

Oct. 22: Raleigh, NC

The Catholic Community of Saint Francis of Assisi hosted a Convocation in which the church held a celebration of Franciscan spirituality for parishioners and friends. The keynote speaker was Dr. Joshua Benson, a publisher and teacher of the history of medieval theology with a special focus on Franciscan figures. He gave a profound talk themed around living in the spirit of St. Francis. These included: Deep sympathy, letting the Lord lead you, the Eucharist, the humility of God, simple awareness and focus on scripture & prayer. He ended with a little prayer from a hermit with Franciscan ties he had learned about while teaching at the Franciscan Institute. "These words became a kind of touchstone for me and I think maybe they can become something of a touchstone for you." He shared with us:

"I am here for you. I have no other person to be here for and no other reason to be here. I am here at your disposal, your disposition. I have no desire except to do what you'd have me do. I have heard of other desires. I haven't heard any that mean as much to me as that. Have you heard of any that would mean as much to me, as knowing I was doing what you wanted me to do? Or even not knowing I was doing it? Simply, doing it. Why would I wish so much to do what you want me to? Only because I think I was made for that purpose. To listen, and do. To get my mind clear enough to listen and then do what I hear I should do. How do I know that the voice I'd hear would be yours? How can I know, that the thing I should do is a good one? I'd know because there is something I know about you. I know that you love me. I know that the things you tell me to do are from love. You don't tell me to kill, you don't tell me to hate, you don't tell me to die. You tell me to love. You tell me to do things love does. You show me the way." He ended by saying, "I hope that can be a prayer for you and you can be in this place and display that love..."

Our very own Gladys Whitehouse, OFS led a workshop to a full room in which the topic was *Can a 12th Century Mystic Still Be Relevant?* She used personal stories to help us relate to Saint Francis and to Franciscan spirituality. She challenged us, "WE are the church and how are we being called to rebuild the church?" She shared words from Pope Francis in her closing for us to reflect.

"Jesus did not found the church as a citadel of purity, nor as a constant parade of heroes and saints. Although, thank God, we do not lack these. It is something much more dynamic, a school of conversion, a place of spiritual combat and discernment, where grace abounds along with sin and temptation. Like it's members the church can be an instrument of God's mercy because it needs that mercy. Just as none of us should reject other people because of their sins and failures but help them to be what they are meant to be. Christ's followers should love and listen to the church. Build her up, take responsibility for her, including her sins and failures. At those moments when the church shows herself to be weak and sinful, let us help her get up again. Let us not condemn or disdain her but care for her like our own mother." She told us, "That's what we are called to do-to love the church, the way we love our own mother." Just as St. Francis would.

"Thankful for Family"



Put your trust in Christ as your personal Savior.

Padre Pio believed that people can and must choose to serve God. To one correspondent he wrote, "I want you to be saved at all costs, and for this purpose you need to surrender to Jesus." On another occasion, he wrote, "I want you to be saved...When will you give me this consolation, brother?" People are to abandon themselves to Jesus "like a child to his mother's arms." Padre Pio urged his disciples to pray to Christ: "Whom have I on earth besides you? Whom have I in heaven but you, my Jesus! You are the God of my heart and my inheritance, whom I desire eternally.

I remember the first time that I saw the Christmas Spectacular at Radio City Music Hall in Manhattan. I was excited to see the Rockettes and their precision dancing live on stage. But it wasn't the famous falling toy soldiers' sequence that thrilled me. It was the closing act. The Christmas Spectacular features the largest live nativity scene in New York City, and the music, the characters, the camels, and the simple beauty of the scene moved me to tears.

We have St. Francis of Assisi to thank for staging the first live nativity in Greccio, Italy, in 1223. Churches throughout Italy brought the Biblical story to life after St. Francis introduced the idea. The live re-enactments of the birth of Jesus were eventually replaced with the mangers we put under our Christmas trees and on our tabletops.

In 2023 we will celebrate the 800th anniversary of the first nativity play in Greccio. Wouldn't it be great if we could observe this event next Christmas with live nativity scenes in all our churches? Camels might be in short supply in this area, but we could reenact the event where God humbled himself and entered our world as a little baby humbly born in a stable in Bethlehem.

Next year marks the beginning of a number of other centenaries that we as Franciscans will observe. The first Rule was adopted in 1223, followed by the receipt of the stigmata by St. Francis in 2024, the creation of the Canticle of the Creatures in 2025; and the Transitus of St. Francis in 2026. You will be hearing about the observance of these events in the future. In the meantime, you can read more about them in this publication. Be thinking of ways we can continue to share St. Francis with the world. By the way, the Rockettes will be celebrating the 90th year of presenting the live nativity at the Christmas Spectacular in 2023. -Sharon Winzeler, OFS
