The Annual Regional Gathering (ARG), of course. This year's ARG's theme is "Celebrating the Rule: 800 Years of Peacemakers in Christ Through Nonviolence." Mark your calendars now for the event scheduled for Aug. 11-13 at the Ridgecrest Conference Center in Black Mountain, NC. This year's speaker is Marie Dennis, OFS, the 2022 recipient of the Pax Christi USA Teacher of Peace Award. She was recognized for her witness and leadership within the Catholic peace and justice movement and her effort to deepen the Catholic Church's commitment to nonviolence as a core value of the gospel. As we celebrate the founding of the Rule 800 years ago in 1223, we will listen and discern ways to nurture its significance in our fraternities and our own lives.



Did you know?

[cont. from May issue] The Regional Executive Council placed the Padre Pio Fraternity under the sponsorship of the Blessed Sacrament Fraternity in Burlington, NC. Elections were to be held in September since Judy was able to get 6 members to step up. Judy and the late beloved Regional Spiritual Assistant, Father Linus Di Santis, OFM Conv. were scheduled to come for a visit that September. In September of 2007, Eileen Schneider was elected as minister and was doing a terrific job. Nicky Hill followed her and was doing a good job as minister, too. However, Nicky had to resign and leave because her granddaughter was seriously ill. Ralph Benedetto, who was the vice-minister, had to move into the minister position. He was well liked but also had to leave soon after because of personal problems. Do you remember what was written last month about the health of fraternities? The fraternity was now in a weak position from 2007 to 2010 as membership dwindled. The members were quitting one by one until it dwindled down to 5 members and for various reasons the fraternity was temporarily deactivated. However, it wasn't long before the new regional minister, Jerry Rousseau, stepped in and appointed a new council with Joanne Jacovec and Jane Sullivan Farris as leaders who helped reestablish this flourishing fraternity into what it is today. This history is in all the newsletters posted on our website.

Did you know that our apostolates are extremely important for our salvation and the salvation of the world? God the Father sent our brother Jesus out for the salvation of the world. That was His apostolate and we, as Secular Franciscans, say that we strive to follow Christ (in the example of St. Francis). The Catechism of the Catholic Church, paragraph 863, states, "The whole Church is apostolic." An apostle is one sent on a mission. Therefore, as a lay apostle, you and I are sent out as Christ was; therefore, we are on a mission for the salvation of the world. If that applies to every Catholic, then how much more does it apply to us? How did Jesus spread the Good News? How did St. Francis do it? Jesus, being God, could miraculously feed the 5,000. St. Francis begged for food to give to the poor and hungry. We can't multiply loaves and don't have a need to beg for food. How then can you and I do it? We have the opportunity to supply food for Oak City Cares. Each month Mary Lou Holloway, OFS, sends out a list of needs. And Lee Cunningham, OFS, reminds us to do this at every gathering. Are you and I willing to go out of our way to fill up that list? We certainly can make a casserole or a salad, boil eggs, and buy bananas, oranges, or other items. We can help serve the food. As large as our fraternity is, there should not be a shortage of food for those less fortunate. Following Christ and St. Francis should inspire us to take an active part in joining other fraternity members to carry out this apostolate chosen by the Padre Pio fraternity. In this way, we help share in our own salvation and the salvation of the world.

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Dishes of the Month

Green Bean Casserole (15 servings)

Ham and Broccoli Bake

One 102 oz can of Hanover green beans (or smaller cans that add up to this amount),

Two 26 oz cans of condensed cream of mushroom soup,

One 6 oz package of French-Fried onions,

Two packets of soy sauce from your favorite takeout place,

One 13x9 Deep disposable aluminum pan.

Warm up oven to 350F first.

Support the aluminum pan with a cookie sheet, it will be heavy. Drain green beans and add to pan. Add soup and stir thoroughly, if too thick add a bit of milk. Add half the pkg of FF onions and soy sauce.

Cook for approx. 45 to 50 minutes to a temp of 165F without covering. It you need to keep it warm cover with aluminum foil and lower oven temp to 200 F.

 $2\,10$ oz pkgs frozen, chopped broccoli

½ c chopped onion

2 T water

2 10.5 oz cans condensed cream of chicken soup

1 c. shredded sharp cheddar cheese (4 oz.)

½ c. milk

3 cups chopped cooked ham

2 cups minute rice

½ tsp. Worcestershire

In a 2 1/2 quart casserole dish, cook in microwave: Broccoli, onion and water covered for 11 minutes. Stir two times. Blend in soup, cheese, milk, cooked ham, cooked rice and Worcestershire. Cook covered 10-11 minutes. Stir two times. Let stand covered for 5 minutes. Stir. This recipe serves 8.



Franciscan Theology of the Eucharist: Does it inform our lives?

In an age that progressively removed the faithful's access to the Eucharist, Saint Francis of Assisi conceived an approach to the Eucharist built upon his embrace of the humanity of Christ. Eucharist provided a means for living in this world as Christ lived and so it influenced the evolution of the community and the Order. Today, how does or how might a Franciscan conception of the Eucharist inspire believers to receive Eucharist as a transformational encounter with Christ and the world?

James "Jim" Sabak, O.F.M., is a Franciscan Friar of the Province of the Most Holy Name of Jesus (New York, New York). He received his Doctorate in Sacramental Theology/Liturgy from The Catholic University of America in 2012. Jim currently holds the position of Director of Worship for the Diocese of Raleigh, North Carolina, and episcopal emcee for the bishop of Raleigh. He has taught at Siena College, Albany, New York; Catholic University, Washington, D.C.; and at the Franciscan School of Theology. In addition to pastoral presentations on liturgical theology and pastoral application of the sacraments, he has written for the journals: Worship, Studia Liturgica, Horizons, and has been a contributor to the "PrayTell Blog." Jim also co-hosts the Potential to be Amazing podcast.



Community is Heart Calling to Heart

"Friendship, marriage, family, religious life (fraternity), and every other form of community is solitude greeting solitude, spirit speaking to spirit, and heart calling to heart. It is the grateful recognition of God's call to share life together and the joyful offering of a hospitable space where the re-creating power of God's Spirit can become manifest. Thus, all forms of life together can become ways to reveal to each other the real presence of God in our midst.

Community has little to do with mutual compatibility. Similarities in educational background, psychological makeup, or social status can bring us together, but they can never be the basis for community. Community is grounded in God, who calls us together, and not in the attractiveness of people to each other. . . . The mystery of community is precisely that it embraces all people, whatever their individual differences may be, and allows them to live together as brothers and sisters of Christ and sons and daughters of his heavenly Father."
