Minister's Memo

Joanne Jacovec, OFS, is a treasure to our fraternity. Some of you will recall her presentation on Padre Pio in the recent past. In the early days of our fraternity's re-emergence starting in 2011, she served as formation director and minister.

Joanne, along with the late Jane Farris, led our fraternity to become the vital, active, prayerful group of Secular Franciscans that we are today. The fraternity was so important to Jane that her husband Tommy Farris sends us a monthly contribution that we use to support our apostolates and scholarships for Seculars who want to attend retreats. You don't see Joanne at gatherings lately because she has dealt with cancer and, more recently, an injury from a freak auto accident that has left her in constant pain and with limited mobility.

Like most Franciscans, Joanne doesn't let that stop her from serving others and speaking up on behalf of those in need. She called the other day with two requests for Catholic Parish Outreach.

- -Keep sending plastic bags for CPO. They are providing food for 130 families per day.
- -Consider donating money to CPO, which often runs out of food by the end of the day.

That means parents who work during the day and stop by CPO in late afternoon often find that the shelves are empty. Joanne says the organization is desperate for donations so that families can be fed. She is so touched by the need that she says she will match whatever the fraternity can donate. "The children are hungry. We need to do what we can to help," Joanne said.

Each month we spend about \$130 purchasing diapers for CPO. This month the council will consider whether we want to offer another donation to help CPO put more food on its shelves. Joanne said the parents often go without meals so that the children can eat. CPO has started offering snacks to parents while they shop so that they can have some light refreshment. How does she know all this? Her husband Al volunteers at CPO a couple of days a week. Meanwhile, Joanne is busy at home knitting hats for the children of CPO visitors so they will stay warm this winter.

The need is great in our community. Please consider whether we should increase our contribution to CPO on a one-time or regular basis and let me or another member of your council know your thoughts.

"Understanding Unconscious Bias." Presented by Carolyn Townes, OFS

Big or small, our actions shape the world around us.

"I love stories... because stories have the power to break down resistance. Stories can override the ego so the spirit message can penetrate... That is why Jesus spoke in parables. Stories or parables can outwit the part of you that resists change." She shared with us a parable of Jesus found in Matthew and offered some explanation. [He came to his native place and taught the people in their synagogue. They were astonished and said, "Where did this man get such wisdom and mighty deeds? Is he not the carpenter's son? Is not his mother named Mary and his brothers James, Joseph, Simon, and Judas? Are not his sisters all with us? Where did this man get all this?" And they took offense at him. But Jesus said to them, "A prophet is not without honor except in his native place and in his own house." And he did not work many mighty deeds there because of their lack of faith. Matthew 53-58]. She added, "The image in their minds did not match the person standing before them. We tend to get angry and indignant when our image of the world is challenged or compromised in any way." She added, "Bias can be positive or negative. Conscious or unconscious. Unconscious bias are the assumptions, stereotypes or unintentional actions we make on others based on identity labels... big or small, our actions shape the world around us."



A Reading from the Holy Gospel According to Matthew (Matthew 25:34-45)

"Then the King will say to those on His right, 'Come, you who are blessed of My Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world. For I was hungry, and you gave Me something to eat; I was thirsty, and you gave Me something to drink; I was a stranger, and you invited Me in; naked, and you clothed Me; I was sick, and you visited Me; I was in prison, and you came to Me.' Then the righteous will answer Him, 'Lord, when did we see You hungry, and feed You, or thirsty, and give You something to drink? And when did we see You a stranger, and invite You in, or naked, and clothe You? When did we see You sick, or in prison, and come to You?'
