This month I'll step aside and let the words of Maddie Price speak to you about the value of serving at our apostolate Oak City Cares. Maddie, 13-year-old daughter of inquirer John Price, wrote an essay on her Christmas experience of working at Oak City. I'm so happy that John and some of you bring family members to our events. It helps us deepen all of our relationships. Here is Maddie's essay.

God can communicate with us in many ways. I think God's main way of communicating with us is by sending people to teach us things. The Trinity can communicate with us through encounters, interactions, people, and our consciences. Sometimes, the experience can be positive and helpful, but other times it can be a call to action or something we need to learn from. One experience that I had when I was positive that the Holy Spirit was present was when my family and I went to serve at Oak City Cares. This experience was both helpful and a call to action for me. It felt awesome to serve my community, but also put things in perspective for me. For a little background, at Oak City, I was in charge of handing out gift bags. (I was serving around the holidays.) The bags had necessities in them, but their contents were not identical. A couple of times, a grown man would come up to my brother (11) and me (13) and ask for deodorant/toothpaste. This was heartbreaking. First, think about how embarrassing it must have been to ask some middle schoolers for something you need for everyday life. It also showed me how much I take for granted. Think about not being able to use toothpaste when you wake up in the morning. Something else that really touched me was the people I was serving alongside. One of the women I was serving with baked cookies for the visitors and sometimes did their laundry. I realize that when writing this, I have made the residents sound all sad and gloomy. They were, in fact, the opposite. They played music and danced with each other. There were so many positive encounters with the residents, and they are normal, just like you and me; they have just had one unexpected life turn. In conclusion, God has communicated with me many times in many different ways, and I think it's important that we recognize when He is trying to tell us something.

Did you know that poets often aim to convey truths most often about the human question that transcend mere facts. My mother's favorite poem was "A Psalm of Life" written by Henry Wadsworth Longfellow (1839). In the stanza that reads, "Lives of great men all remind us; we can make our lives sublime, and, departing, leave behind us - footprints on the sands of time..." In fact, the entire poem reminds me of our January "Rite of Extraction." We choose our saint, virtue and saying. So, what are we going to do with it? We pray that with the help of the Holy Spirit, may the saint given us will inspire us to exercise Christian virtue, and to follow Jesus more closely. This is such a sacrosanct tradition of our Franciscan family. To imitate the saints is to love as God has loved you. To live that love in your life and with your neighbors. All Christians are called to be saints. Saints are persons who lived boldly virtuous lives and offered their life for others. Something we strive to do by helping the poor and homeless through Oak City Cares and Catholic Parish Outreach Food Pantry. Catholic Charities in Raleigh can provide up to a week's worth of food items and groceries to residents of Wake County through Catholic Parish Outreach pantry. In order to receive food from the charity an individual needs to be referred by a social service agency or a church and they also need to bring a completed referral form with them. The Catholic Parish Outreach is located at 2013 N. Raleigh Blvd. A number of our members do volunteer work there. Oak City Cares is a hub for connecting individuals and families who are at risk of or are experiencing homelessness, to coordinated services that create a path to stable housing and renewed hope. Their staff coordinates services offered by human service professionals, medical providers, and other specialists from multiple partners at one location. Guests of Oak City Cares are provided with access to showers, laundry, a hospitality area with coffee, computers, and cell phone charging stations. Volunteers play important roles by helping people feel a sense of connection to a community, helping to renew hope. See Mary Cockrill, OFS or Mary Lou Holloway, OFS for additional information. I experienced not only a desire to be embraced, but also a fear of losing my independence. I realized that God's love is a jealous love. God wants not just a part of me, but all of me. Only when I surrender myself completely to God's love can I expect to be free from endless distractions, ready to hear the voice of love, and able to recognize my own unique call.
