I can't help but draw a comparison between the cosmos and our lives as Secular Franciscans.

We also donate \$150 worth of diapers each month to CPO. Since their needs are increasing, so are our donations. This month we asked members to donate extra diapers and you generously gave 872 additional diapers to CPO. Thank you for your generosity.

Our servers at Oak City go out into the dining room and talk to our guests, asking them if we can pray for them. Prayer requests are recorded and will be passed along to you. This month we will begin listing them in this newsletter. This is another way to spread seeds of Divine love.

As Franciscans, we follow the path that Jesus led, honoring the dignity of all people and living in solidarity through our presence, prayer, food and other donations. As we respond to the call to sow good seeds on earth for our Heavenly Father, we plant His hope, beauty and love in the lives of others. Sharing Our Blessings - St. Clare, August 11, Foundress of the Poor Clares

Quote: "Place your mind before the mirror of eternity! Place your soul in the brilliance of glory! Place your heart in the figure of the divine substance! And transform your whole being into the image of the Godhead Itself through contemplation!"

Contemporary accounts glow with admiration of her life in the convent of San Damiano in Assisi. She served the sick, waited on table, washed the feet of the begging nuns. She came from prayer, it was said, with her face so shining it dazzled those about her. She suffered serious illness for the last twenty-seven years of her life. Her influence was such that popes, cardinals, and bishops often came to consult her–she never left the walls of San Damiano. A well-known story concerns her prayer and trust. She had the Blessed Sacrament placed on the walls of the convent when it faced attack by invading Saracens. "Does it please you, O God, to deliver into the hands of these beasts the defenseless children I have nourished with your love? I beseech you, dear Lord, protect these whom I am now unable to protect." To her sisters she said, "Don't be afraid. Trust in Jesus." The Saracens fled.

Presenters Mercedes Cooley, OFS and Marianne Norris shared with us the story of Saint Francis' stigmata. Marianne read to us an excerpt from the Little Flowers of Saint Francis, and we reflected upon some of Saint Bonaventure's writings in a video. It was notable to add, Saint Francis did not openly discuss what had happened to him and how it affected him daily but rather many learned of his sharing in the pain Jesus felt after his passing.

We were reminded that he was praying during the observation of Saint Michael's Lent, which he participated in faithfully every year, when his stigmata first appeared, and the seraphim gifted him with the closeness to Jesus he so fervently desired.

As a Fraternity we are invited to participate in this year's observance of Saint Michael's Lent in our own way or together in prayer via Zoom every Sunday from August 15, The Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary until September 29, the Feast of the Holy Archangels. The Zoom will be held at 7p and last 30min to 45min. More details to come soon.

- 5. List some incidents in Francis's life or passages in his writings that help you to understand why God might have given Francis this gift.
- 6. What thoughts do you have as to how you can celebrate the 40 days of St. Michael's Lent?

**Starting Day: 15<sup>th</sup> August** (Solemnity of the Assumption of Mary)

Final Day: 29<sup>th</sup> September (Feast of the Holy Archangels - Saint Michael, Saint Gabriel, and Saint Raphael)

#### Practical Recommendations:

- Light a blessed candle before a statue or image of Saint Michael, the Archangel.
- · Make the sign of the Cross.
- Offer a particular sacrifice during the 40 days
- Seek the Sacrament of Reconciliation at some point during the 40 days.
- Offer this devotion to a special intention or grace you are seeking.

Tommy Brown- Pray for his wife in [the] nursing home and for his health Rielle- Pray she finds a way to leave NC within a month


Landon- Pray for[a] job [for him]
