ST. FRANCIS & THE VIRGIN MARY

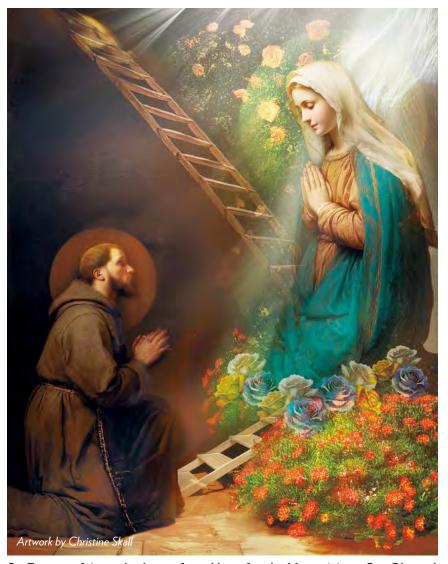
St. Francis had a profound devotion to Our Blessed Mother

with great joy we celebrate some significant Marian feast days during the months of September and October.

Upcoming Marian feast days are The Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary (8 September), Our Lady of Sorrows (15 September), and Our Lady of the Rosary (7 October).

Franciscans have a deep devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary, and a great love for her, that is clearly rooted in St. Francis of Assisi's own profound love for Our Blessed Mother whom he considered the mother of God and a personal guide to Jesus. St. Francis was truly a faithful "Knight of the great Queen". The closer we become to Mary, the closer she brings us to Jesus. Marv is a model of complete faith, humility, obedience and selfsurrender to God. Her "yes" to God in the Annunciation directly serves as an example

REFLECTION

John's account of Jesus' death is highly symbolic. When Jesus gives the beloved disciple to Mary, we are invited to appreciate Mary's role in the Church: She symbolizes the Church; the beloved disciple represents all believers. As Mary mothered Jesus, she is now mother to all his followers. Furthermore, as Jesus died, he handed over his Spirit. Mary and the Spirit cooperate in begetting new children of God—almost an echo of Luke's account of Jesus' conception. Christians can trust that they will continue to experience the caring presence of Mary and Jesus' Spirit throughout their lives and throughout history.

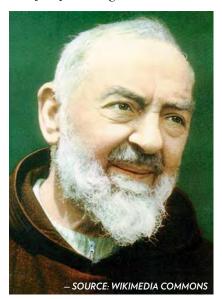

SHARING OUR BLESSINGS

A Poor Brother Who Prays

Born into a poor Italian farm family, from a young age Francesco Forgione desired to be a friar. When he was sixteen, he entered the novitiate of the Capuchin Order, and took the name Brother Pius (Fra Pio). He was ordained to the priesthood in 1910. Six years later, he joined the convent of Santa Maria delle Grazie in San Giovanni Rotondo, where he spent many hours every day hearing Confessions.

The height of his apostolic commitment was the celebration of the Holy Mass. He described himself as "a poor brother who prays." "Prayer is the greatest weapon we have," he said. It is "a key to open the heart of God."

An Extraordinary Meeting

In 1948, Padre Pio heard the Confession of a young Polish priest, Father Karol Wojtyła, who thirty years later would ascend the throne of Peter, taking the name John Paul II. It was during John Paul's pontificate that Padre Pio was declared blessed. During the rite of beatification, the Pope said that in the humble friar, we see the image of Christ suffering and rising. "His body," he said, "marked by the 'stigmata,' showed the intimate connection between death and resurrection Not less sorrowful, and humanly much more scorching, were the trials he had to suffer as a consequence, one could say, of his singular charisms."

For Padre Pio, "suffering with Christ" was a gift: "In contemplating the Cross on Jesus' shoulders," he said, "I always feel strengthened and I exult with holy joy... All that Jesus suffered in His Passion, I too have suffered, insofar as it is possible for a human creature.

Relief From Suffering

The life of Padre Pio also shows an intense commitment to alleviate the sufferings of families. In 1956 he inaugurated the "Casa Sollievo della Sofferenza" (the House of Relief from Suffering), a new state of the art hospital. "It is the apple of my eye," the friar said when

the hospital opened. "This is the creation that Providence, with your help, has created. Gaze at it in wonder, and with me bless the Lord God. He has placed upon the earth a seed that He will warm with His rays of love."

Death

Padre Pio died during the night of 23 September 1968, at the age of 81. On 16 June 2002, he was proclaimed a saint by Pope John Paul II. In his homily, the Pope said, "The life and mission of Padre Pio prove that difficulties and sorrows, if accepted out of love, are transformed into a privileged way of holiness, which opens onto the horizons of a greater good, known only to the Lord."

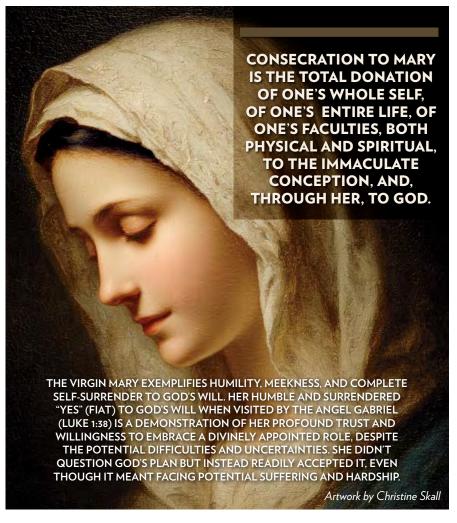

Mary, Mother of Jesus, is the model of listening to the Word and of faithfulness to vocations. We, like Francis, seek all the gospel virtues realized in her. The brothers and sisters should cultivate intense love for the most holy Virgin, with imitation, prayer,

and filial abandonment. They should manifest their own devotion with expressions of genuine faith, in forms accepted by the Church. Mary is the model of fruitful and faithful love for the entire ecclesial community. Secular Franciscans and their fraternities should seek to live the experience of Francis, who made the Virgin the guide of his activity. With her, like the disciples at Pentecost, they should welcome The Spirit to create a community of love. " -SFOConstitutions, Article 16.1, .2

Go to Mary and she will take you straight to Her Son, Jesus. This is her primary role. She is not meant to overshadow Jesus or the work of the Holy Spirit in our lives but rather to point us directly towards Him and bring us to Him, acting as a guide for us on the path to holiness.

CONSECRATION TO MARY

Many Franciscans (and Catholics in general) practice a total consecration to Mary, entrusting their entire lives to her care and guidance. Consecration to Mary is the total donation of one's whole self, of one's entire life, of one's faculties, both physical and spiritual, to the Immaculate Conception, and, through Her, to God. This gift, which the consecrated soul offers to his Mother and

Queen, is a perfect sacrifice that man offers (of himself). We will delve more deeply into Total Consecration to Mary within upcoming newsletters since it is a devotion of tremendous importance. I can imagine just how much Jesus loves seeing us become closer to His beloved mother. How could He not?

Sometimes there is the tendency to view Francis's devotion to Mary as somewhat

of an isolated entity, separate from his spiritual life. Yet, Francis's love for Mary was so much a part of him that it is almost impossible to separate his Marian devotion from his daily life. His deep spirituality, devotion to Mary, and every aspect of his daily life were all so interconnected they were simply one and the same.

According to a pious legend, one day St. Francis of Assisi had a vision in which he saw Tertiaries shall love the most Blessed Virgin Mother of Jesus with a tender and filial affection, and honor her as Queen and Patron of the Order with special devotion and reverence.

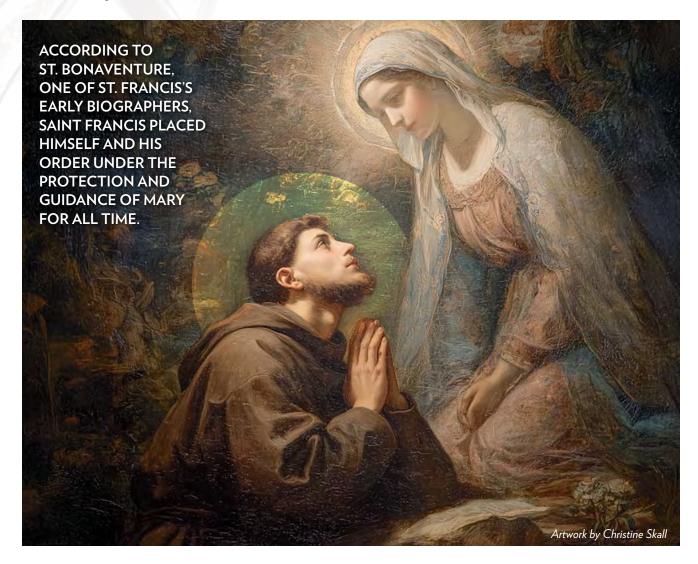
his friars trying to reach Christ by a ladder that was red and very steep. After climbing a few rungs, they would suddenly fall back. Our Lord then showed St. Francis another ladder, white and much less steep, at whose summit appeared the Blessed Virgin, and He said to Francis: "Advise your sons to go by the ladder of My Mother" ¹

MARY'S RELATIONSHIP WITH HER SON

To develop a true understanding and love of Jesus Christ, the Son of God made Man, requires a sincere devotion toward His mother. Mary was with Him from the womb to the tomb. She responded to God's call. The Holy Spirit came upon her and the power of the Most High overshadowed her (*Luke 1:35*). She gave birth to Him. She and Joseph presented Him at the Temple. She raised Him and taught Him, with Joseph, how to pray. She sought Him until she found Him in the Temple. She was with Him when He left us at Calvary. Saint Francis recognized Mary's powerful and extraordinary relationship with Her Son in light of our salvation. Therefore, Francis implored his followers to love her as their self-effacing gentle queen and mother. 2

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HONORING MARY AS QUEEN AND PATRON

Fr. Chris Shorrock, OFM Conv., CNSA shares the following: "The seraphic father himself admonished his brethren that they should attribute to the blessed Mother of God every privilege which may be appropriate to her excellence, and that they should exalt her with all the praise that is appropriate for such a pure human creature." ³

"Tertiaries shall love the most Blessed Virgin Mother of Jesus with a tender and filial affection, and honor her as Queen and Patron of the Order with special devotion and reverence." — *SFO Constitutions*, *Article 69*.

Fr. Chris Shorrock, OFM Conv. continues: "Let us then turn to some rather general remarks about Francis and his love and devotion to Mary. Francis endeavored to follow Christ as closely as possible by surrendering his life into the hands of his loving Father and therefore could not help loving in a special way the pure and most holy Virgin who was chosen by The Father to

be the mother of His Divine Son. Francis clearly perceived and presented Mary as the model of every Christian who responds to the presence of God in their lives."

"According to St. Bonaventure (d. 1274), one of Francis's early biographers, Francis placed himself and his order under the protection and guidance of Mary for all time."

On one side we should show Mary in all her poverty of Bethlehem placing the most

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sweet Son of God upon the rough straw of the manger. In the other half of our painting, we would portray Mary, the Immaculate Mother of God, and Queen of the Seraphic Order, in the chapel of Mary of the Angels stretching forth her arms in motherly protection over all her Franciscan sons and daughters. 4

'From his earliest days, according to the biographer Thomas of Celano, Francis "burned with devotion toward the mother of all good." When Francis abandoned the world, he placed himself under the loving care and protection of his heavenly Mother. He asked her to be his guide and advocate in his new life of poverty after the pattern of her Son. Thomas of Celano tells us, "He embraced the Mother of Jesus with inexpressible love, since she made the Lord of Majesty a brother to us. He honoured her with his own Praises, poured out prayers to her, and offered her his love in a way that no human tongue can express. But what gives us greatest joy is that he appointed her the Advocate of the Order and placed under her wings the sons he left behind, that she might protect and cherish them to the end." 5

Recalling the words of Thomas of Celano, "he embraced the Mother of Jesus with an inexpressible love, since she made the Lord of Majesty a brother to us," Bonaventure adds "and, through her, we have obtained mercy." '6

'In these simple words of the early biographers, we see the deepest foundation for the reverence Francis showed toward Mary. For him, the Incarnation was the basis of his whole spiritual life, and he would go out of his way to follow in every way the example of the word made flesh. Therefore, it would seem only natural that he "owed" a special love to this unique woman, who brought God within our reach and "made the Lord of Majesty a brother to us." 'So

Orientees Vicki Jack and Lynn Meserole attended

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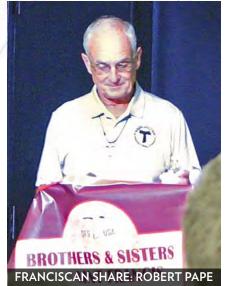

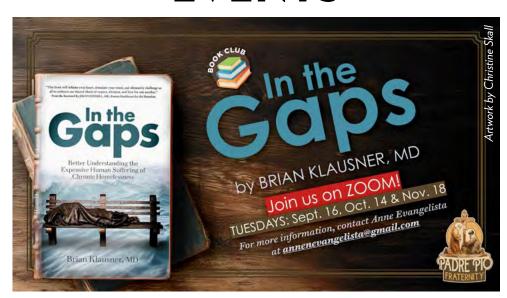

n a heartfelt presentation, Travis Bongiorno, OFS, shared his personal journey of rediscovering faith through the maternal love of the Blessed Virgin Mary at our monthly gathering on Ăugust 24.

MARIAN DEVOTION & FRANCISCAN **FRATERNITY**

Reflecting on the legacy of St. Francis and the quiet strength of his grandfather, Travis explored how Marian devotion and Franciscan fraternity brought healing, purpose, and deep spiritual renewal.

Travis offered a deeply moving reflection titled "Fiat Voluntas Tua: A Franciscan Journey in the Love of Mary, the Mother of God." In his address, Travis

invited brothers and sisters into his personal journey of rediscovering faith through the lens of Marian devotion and Franciscan spirituality.

Travis began by grounding his story in the life of St. Francis of Assisi, who rebuilt his own heart while rebuilding the sanctuary

of the Portiuncula. Francis' love for the Blessed Virgin Mary was central to that transformation, and Fr. Stefano Manelli, a Franciscan friar of the Immaculate, would later reflect on this chapel as a "Marian womb," where Mary spiritually formed Francis in virtue and love.

Travis connected this sacred history with his own experience.

A PERSONAL WITNESS TO DEEP TRUST IN GOD

A cradle Catholic, he said he once had little personal devotion to Mary. But that began to change through the quiet witness of his grandfather, Felix Ruggieri, a man who modeled profound trust in God through immense suffering. Felix lost his teenage son, cared for his wife through years of mental and physical illness, and faced his own terminal diagnosis with unwavering joy

and service. Despite adversity, Felix remained faithful to Mary, praying before an image of the Madonna of the Streets which showed Mary as a spiritual warrior holding the Christ Child.

Travis recalled the powerful image of this humble depiction: a mother defending her child with nothing but prayer and presence. It reminded him of the strong, courageous, poor in spirit but rich in faith Mary. Watching his grandfather's steadfast love through suffering

planted seeds that would bloom in Travis years later.

Like many young adults, Travis struggled during his college years. Influenced by secular philosophy and grieving the loss of his grandparents, he left the Church and explored a life without God.

MARY, QUEEN OF HEAVEN AND OUR OWN PERSONAL MOTHER

It was there, in the silence of despair, that Mary reappeared—not with condemnation, but as a tender Mother. Travis began to ask new questions—not philosophical ones, but deeply human ones: What was it like to hold Eternity in your arms? To see the face of Truth itself, gazing back at you? These meditations reignited his faith and led him to rediscover Mary not only as Queen of Heaven, but as his own Mother.

His conversion reached its fullness when he professed into the Secular Franciscan Order six years ago. There, Travis encountered Mary more deeply through his fraternity, his formation, and his marriage. He spoke lovingly of his wife, Rachel, our vice-minister, who has become an icon of Mary's patience and sacrificial love in his daily life. "I have seen my Seraphic Mother in our regional minister, our local minister, our formation director," he said, "but I have seen her most poignantly in Rachel."

Travis closed his talk by inviting all present to entrust themselves more deeply to Mary, echoing the words Our Lady of Guadalupe spoke to St. Juan Diego:

"Am I not here, I, who am your Mother? Are you not under my shadow and my

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protection? Am I not the source of your joy? Are you not in the hollow of my mantle, in the crossing of my arms?"

Conversation in the Spirit discussions followed Travis's presentation, and all members present talked about their relationship with Mary.

Tell us a little about your faith and your relationship with God.

I've been quite a pious person since the age of five. My earliest memory of this was in the Presbyterian Church in which I was baptized in Pennsylvania. In Sunday School we were learning about how God is in Heaven when all of a sudden I started crying. My Sunday School teacher asked what was wrong, and all I said was "I just want to see God." I still do want to see God and I long for the beatific vision. Sometimes I struggle with consistent formal prayer, but I've loved reading

about mystics like Thomas Merton, St. Teresa of Avila, and St. John of the Cross who have aided me to deepen my understanding and awareness of the many ways in which we can invite God's presence into any given moment of the day. I cherish intimate moments in mental prayer early in the morning as the sun rises, or in Eucharistic Adoration at Our Lady of Lourdes or wherever there is an Adoration Chapel. The Eucharist is what largely drew me to start exploring Catholicism in 2021 when my now wife, Sofia, shared with me a talk by Fr. Mike Schmitz called "The Hour That Will Change Your Life" at a FOCUS SEEK conference.

Why did you feel called to become a Secular Franciscan?

As I've progressed in formation each and every month, I feel more and more peace and consolation at the prospect of being a disciple of Jesus Christ by following in the footsteps of St. Francis. 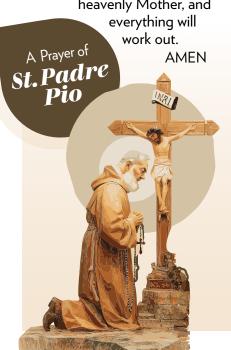

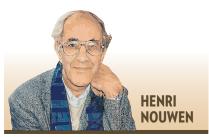

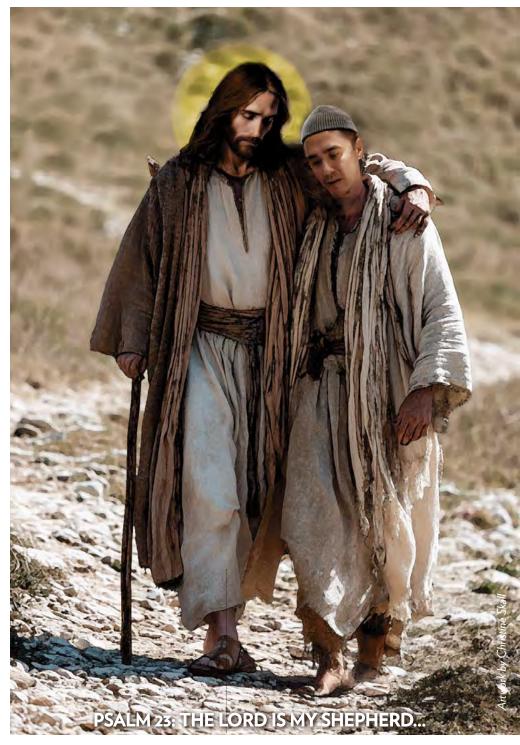


PRESENCE OF GOD - Grant, O Lord, that even while I am here on earth, I may love You as I shall love You in heaven.

MEDITATION

1. If it may be said that by faith "eternal life begins in us" (St. Thomas, IIe II, q.4, a.1, co.), the same may be said—and with greater reason—of charity, which will remain unchanged even in heaven. Eternal life will be essentially a life of love, of love which has reached its greatest height, for when we know God perfectly by the beatific vision, we shall finally be able to fulfill with absolute perfection the precept of loving God with all our strength. On this earth such perfection is possible only

relatively; nevertheless, even now we possess the same charity with which we shall love God in heaven. Therefore, we can begin even now that life of love which will flower completely in eternity. Our love in heaven will have the characteristics of completeness and absolute continuity, with the impossibility of its ever failing. We cannot attain this while we are on earth, but we can strive for it by the exercise of a pure, intense love, a love that is, as far as possible, always in action. These, then, are the qualities our love for God should have: purity, intensity, continuity.

Our love for God will be pure when we love Him so much that we seek only His glory and the accomplishment of His will: "Hallowed be Thy name... Thy *will be done*"(*Mt* **6,9.10**). This is the only real good that we, poor creatures, can wish for our God. All the glory we can possibly give Him consists in saying a wholehearted yes to His holy will, in rivalling the angels and blessed in heaven by carrying out His will here on earth with such great love and completeness: Thy will be done on earth

as it is in heaven" (ibid.). The purity of our love should consist in seeking God's glory alone, His will alone, completely forgetting ourself, in being ready to sacrifice every wish, desire, and interest for Him.

Therefore, even in the spiritual life, our first thought should be, not our own perfection, progress, and consolation, but always God's delight, good pleasure, and glory. It is thus that we will serve our own interests better, for he who gives himself to God, completely forgetting himself, draws down upon himself the fullness of divine love. What greater good could come to us than being loved by Infinite Love?

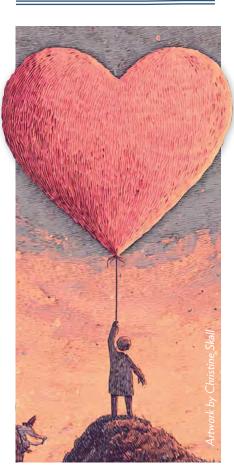
2. But then it is necessary that our love for God be intense and vigorous, because in this way the inclination of our will toward Him will always grow stronger. "Amormeus pondus meum," St. Augustine says, "love is the weight which draws me, which draws my entire being, all my will, all my *life, into God*". And it is necessary that this weight increase, so as to draw us into God with an everincreasing speed. St. John of the Cross says that one degree of love is sufficient for a soul to be in its center, which is God, but the more degrees of love it has, the deeper it goes into its center, and hence, "the strongest love is the most unitive love" (LF 1,13).

Love becomes stronger and increases by exercise, provided the exercise is generous and intense, making use of all the powers of the soul. When we perform our actions, not carelessly or negligently, but with our whole heart, that is, with all the good will of which we are capable, our love immediately increases, and with every act there is a corresponding growth in charity. In this way our love will always continue to grow, it will become strong and mature, and will be able to draw us wholly into God. Let us try, then, to make as many acts of love as possible during the course of our day so that we will be able to live—as far as is attainable in this life—in continual, actual love. But there is one time in the day which is especially intended to make us more fervent in charity, and this is the time of prayer, prayer understood as an intimate encounter of our soul with God by love, as an intercourse of friendship between God and us. It is especially then that we must endeavor to recollect ourself; we should renew the resolution of our will to give ourself entirely to God, to seek His will always, and to fulfill His good pleasure above everything else. We should pray to find God, to remain near Him as friend with Friend. Let us ask Him humbly, but with gentle insistance, to teach us how to love Him as we will love Him one day in heaven. Just as human friendship is strengthened by the frequent meeting of friends, so divine friendshipcharity—is strengthened in the same way; charity grows stronger in prayer, which is the friendly, loving meeting of the soul with God.

"My love for You must be delicate. Help me to reach that exquisiteness and delicacy. that regard for details which You appreciate so much, which delights You.

"My love for You should be strong and generous, and prove itself in sacrifice, in seeking sacrifice in the offering and the smiling acceptance of suffering. O God, for love of You, I want to take advantage of the little opportunities so that I may be strong in the big ones" (Sr. Carmela of the Holy Spirit, O.C.D.).

THE POWERFUL Hail Marys

he Three Hail Marys devotion is a Catholic practice of praying three Hail Marys each morning and evening, often with an accompanying invocation, to honor Mary's privileges and ask for purity from mortal sin. This devotion, linked to saints such as St. Leonard of Port Maurice, St. Alphonsus Liquori, St. Gertrude the Great, and St. Mechtilde, offers special promises of a pure body and holy soul, protection from sin, and a good death for those who are faithful to it.



HOW TO PRAY THE THREE HAIL MARYS

1. INVOKE MARY'S PRIVILEGES:

Each of the three Hail Marys is said in honor of one of Mary's unique privileges, connected to the Holy Trinity.

2. ADD THE INVOCATIONS:

After each Hail Mary, an aspiration is added.

MORNING: "O my Mother, preserve me this day from mortal sin".

EVENING: "O my Mother, preserve me this night from mortal sin".

3. CONCLUDE WITH PRAYER:

After the three Hail Marys, a final prayer, such as "By thy pure and immaculate conception, Oh, Mary! make my body pure, and my soul holy," can be added.

SIGNIFICANCES & PROMISES

HONORING MARY:

The devotion is a way to praise and consecrate one's soul, body, and heart to Mary, honoring her as the Daughter of the Eternal Father, Mother of the Son of God, and Spouse of the Holy Ghost.

PROTECTION FROM SIN:

A key purpose is to gain protection from mortal sin, with particular emphasis on maintaining purity of mind, heart, and body.

PROMISES AND INDULGENCES:

GOOD DEATH: St. Mechtilde received a promise that a faithful soul would receive a beautiful apparition from the Blessed Virgin Mary at the hour of death.

SALVATION: St. Leonard of Port Maurice promised eternal

salvation to those who remained faithful to this daily practice.

INDULGENCES: Pope Leo XIII and St. Pius X granted indulgences to those who devoutly practice this devotion.

KEY FIGURES & ORIGINS:

ST. MECHTILDE: This practice was revealed to her, including the promise of a good death.

ST. GERTRUDE THE GREAT: She also received revelations about the devotion.

ST. LEONARD OF PORT MAURICE: A great promoter of the practice, who promised eternal salvation to the faithful.

ST. ALPHONSUS LIGUORI:

A strong supporter who recommended its use and even imposed it as a penance.

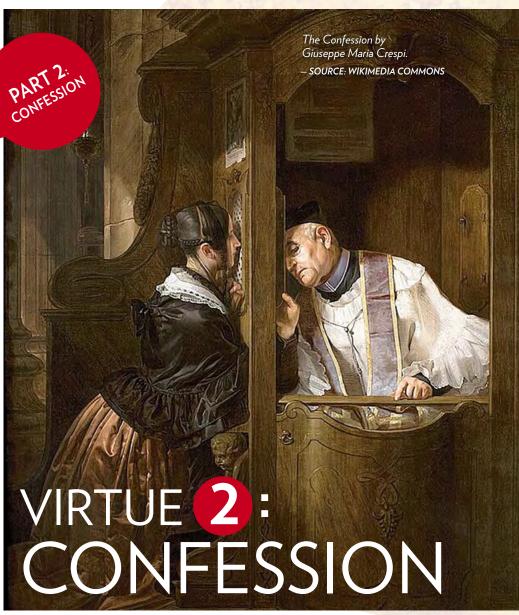

REGARDING CONFESSION...

SCRIPTURE: "If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness." (1 John 1:9)



WRITINGS OF ST. FRANCIS

Let all my blessed brothers, both clerics and lay, confess their sins to priests of our religion. If they cannot, let them confess to other discerning and Catholic priests, knowing with certainty that, when they have received penance and absolution from any Catholic priest, they are without doubt absolved from

their sins, provided they have humbly and faithfully fulfilled the penance imposed on them. (*The Earlier Rule, Chapter XX*)

INCIDENT FROM THE LIFE OF SAINT FRANCIS

One day, although still sick from a quartan fever, he had the people of Assisi called

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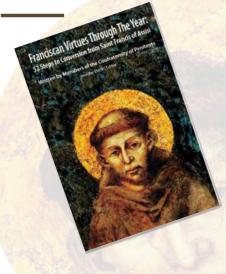

to the piazza for a sermon. When he had finished preaching, he requested that no one leave until he returned.... Taking off his tunic, blessed Francis ordered Brother Peter to lead him naked with a rope tied around his neck in front of the people. He ordered another brother to take a bowl full of ashes and, mounting the place from where he had preached, to throw them and sprinkle them on his head.... In this way he came back in front of the people naked, to the place where he had preached, and said: "You believe me to be a holy man, as do others who, following my example, leave the world and enter the religion and life of the brothers. But I confess to God and to you that during my illness I ate meat and broth flavored with meat." Almost all of the people began to weep out of piety and compassion for



him, especially since it was wintertime and was very cold and he had not yet recovered from the quartan fever. They struck their breasts, accusing themselves. "This holy man," they said, "whose life we know, accuses himself with such shame over a just and manifest necessity. Yet because of excessive abstinence

and the severity with which he treats his body from the moment of his conversion to Christ, we see him living in flesh that is almost dead. What shall we do, wretches that we are, we who all our life have lived, and wish to live, according to the will and desires of the flesh?". (The Assisi Compilation, Section 80).



CONFESSION IS A SACRAMENT AS WELL AS A VIRTUE.

In this reflection, we are discussing confession as a virtue rather than a Sacrament. Sacramental confession is made to a priest who gives absolution for sins and assigns a penance for them. The virtue of confession urges us to confess to others, possibly often.

Do you remember your first confession? It may not have been in church in the confessional. You may have had to confess to stealing a cookie or breaking a toy when you were just a youngster. Confession is often a humiliating experience. We have to admit to someone else that we did something wrong, when more than anything we want to believe that we are perfect, and we want to bring others to that same

belief. Confession is a great way to acknowledge that we are far from perfect.

The toddler who steals cookies or breaks a toy has been caught in the act of doing something wrong, but many times we can do wrong secretly. When we sin in secret, no one knows but God. Most often we confess these things to the priest in the privacy of the confessional. Yet notice how St. Francis confessed to the general public what he considered to be secret sins, even though the food the ate was necessary for his health.

We often refrain from confessing to others because we still think like the toddler — we want to be perfect, and we want others to think that we are perfect, even though we know we are not. What are you hiding from others that should be confessed to them? Is it difficult to say, "I made a mistake on that; I forgot that; I have been ignoring you; I am too self-centred?"

Spend a minimum of five minutes meditating on the Virtue of Confession. Do not write anything during this time. Merely begin your time by praying, "Lord, help me to understand the Virtue of Confession and where I need it in my life."

At the end of your meditation time, ask yourself: What do I need to confess? Who do I need to confess

to? Should I confess to them? When can I do this? Why am I afraid to confess to someone? What can I do about my fears?

Find another section in Scripture which illustrates the Virtue of Confession. Find a statement of Jesus or an incident in His life that deals with the Virtue of Confession. Write these into your journal.

If you are a member of a Religious Order, find one place in your Rule or Constitutions which calls for the Virtue of Confession. Explain why you chose this section.

Practice the Virtue of Confession this week. Record in your journal any memorable insights or happenings.

Each evening, examine your day for the times when you confessed or should have confessed to another. Evaluate why you did or did not confess and how you felt. Pray each night, "Lord, help me to acknowledge my weaknesses to myself and to others and to know that You, and probably others, will forgive me. Please help me to forgive myself. Amen."

At the end of the week, record in your journal what you have learned from this exercise.

THE GREAT **IMPORTANCE OF FREQUENT** CONFESSION

ather Donald Calloway emphasizes the importance and necessity of confession, noting that "only those who know that they have a spiritual mother go to

frequent confession" and that it is a place to receive a "free spiritual diaper change". He also states, "The truth hurts when we are sinners and when we acknowledge we are not surrendering to the truth," highlighting the humbling nature of admitting one's sins to Jesus through the priest.

KEY ASPECTS OF FATHER CALLOWAY'S VIEWS ON CONFESSION:

SPIRITUAL MOTHERHOOD:

Calloway connects a relationship with the Virgin Mary to a desire for frequent confession, suggesting that devotion to Mary fosters a closer relationship with the Church and its Sacraments.

HUMILITY & TRUTH: He points out that the truth revealed in confession can be difficult and humbling, requiring a surrender to God's truth.

JESUS IN THE PRIEST: He stresses that in confession, Jesus Himself is present through the person of the priest, waiting to offer mercy and compassion to those who confess their sins.

A PLACE OF HEALING:

Confession is described as a way to receive spiritual healing and to unburden oneself from sin.

THE "DIAPER CHANGE": The imagery of a "free spiritual diaper change" highlights the cleansing and restorative nature of the Sacrament of Reconciliation, which Calloway associates with a connection to Our Lady.

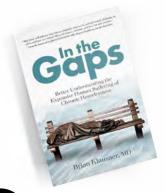

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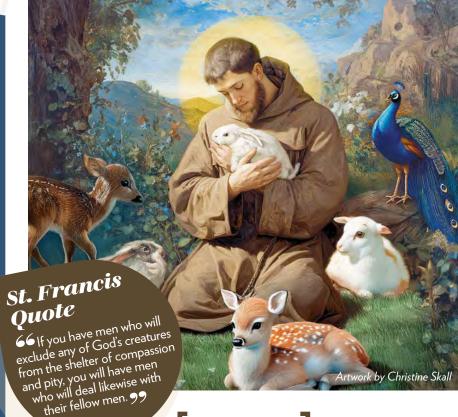

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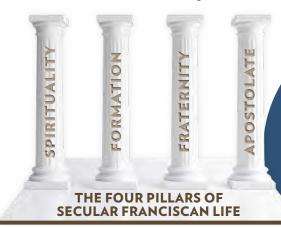
