#### LOVING JESUS IN OUR NEIGHBOR


#### St. Clare of Assisi made sure to make each stranger she met feel like a much-loved neighbor

t. Clare of Assisi was a woman whose life exemplified the principle of loving Jesus in her neighbour.

She loved Jesus in her neighbour through her radical commitment to poverty, prayer and service, compassion for others (particularly for the poor and sick), and vision of seeing Christ reflected in every person. She truly embodied the Gospel's call to love one's neighbor.

Inspired by St. Francis, left her comfortable life of wealth and riches behind her and founded the contemplative order of the Poor Clares, dedicating her life to a radical simplicity that allowed her to directly encounter and serve Christ in those on the margins of society. She saw her service as an outward expression of her inward love for God and found strength in compassion for others.

#### REFLECTION

It is sometimes difficult for modern Westerners to appreciate a feast like this. The Eastern Church, however, was quite open to this feast and even somewhat insistent about celebrating it. Even though the feast has no basis in history, it stresses an important truth about Mary: From the beginning of her life, she was dedicated to God. She herself became a greater temple than any made by hands. God came to dwell in her in a marvelous manner and sanctified her for her unique role in God's saving work. At the same time, the magnificence of Mary enriches her children. They-we-too are temples of God and sanctified in order that we might enjoy and share in God's saving work.

## THE PURE JOY OF FALL COLORS



SHARING OUR BLESSINGS

very autumn brilliant reds, glowing golds, and warm ambers sweep across trees, turning even the simplest walk into a wonderland.

But behind this dazzling display lies a story of chemistry, sunlight and survival. As autumn arrives with shorter days and longer nights, the chemical compound of many tree leaves transform with a kaleidoscope of reds, oranges, and yellows. This stunning shift is all thanks to leaf pigments, special molecules that absorb and reflect light in different ways.

There are three chemical compounds that are involved in pigmentation:

- CAROTENOIDS: Produces yellow, orange, and brown colors in such things as corn, carrots, and daffodils, as well as rutabagas, buttercups, and bananas.
- ANTHOCYANIN: Gives color to such familiar things as cranberries, red apples, concord grapes, blueberries, cherries, strawberries, and plums.

■ CHLOROPHYLL: Gives leaves a basic green color. It is necessary for photosynthesis, the chemical reaction that enables plants to us sunlight to manufacture sugars for food. As night length increases in the autumn, chlorophyll production in leaves slow down then is eventually destroyed. The carotenoids and anthocyanin that are present in the leaf are then unmasked and begin to show their colors.

#### **SPECIES COLOR CHARACTERISTICS**

- OAKS: red, brown, or russet
- HICKORIES: golden bronze
- ASPEN & YELLOW POPLAR: golden yellow
- DOGWOOD: purplish red
- BEECH: light tan
- SOURWOOD AND BLACK TUPELO: crimson

#### THE COLOR OF MAPLE **LEAVES DIFFERS SPECIES BY SPECIES**

- RED MAPLE: brilliant scarlet
- SUGAR MAPLE: orange-red
- BLACK MAPLE: glowing yellow
- STRIPE MAPLE: almost colorless

#### AFTER LEAVES FALL

In addition to great viewing possibilities, there are other ways to take advantage of autumns. Instead of sending fallen leaves to the landfill, consider these practical and eco-friendly ways to make the most of them to help your garden soil become richer, provide wildlife shelter or the ability to find food, and for you or the kids to use in craft projects.



#### YOUR GARDEN

- MULCH: Shred fallen leaves and spread them around flower beds, trees, and shrubs to retain moisture, suppress weeds, and enrich soil naturally.
- COMPOST: Leaves are carbon-rich, making them perfect for balancing nitrogen-heavy food scraps in your compost pile.
- LEAF MOLD: Stack leaves in a quiet corner and let them decompose slowly into a dark, crumbly soil conditioner that boosts texture and water retention.


#### SUPPORT WILDLIFE

- HABITAT: Leaf piles provide shelter for insects, amphibians, and small animals during colder months. They also offer camouflage from predators.
- FEEDING GROUNDS: Birds squirrels, and other critters forage through leaf piles to uncover insects, acorns, and other hidden treats.
  - POLLINATOR SUPPORT:

Many beneficial insects, including native bees and butterflies, rely on leaf litter to complete their life cycles. Leaving some area undisturbed helps preserve biodiversity.

#### EMBRACING RADICAL POVERTY FOR OTHERS

As a noblewoman in 13th-century Assisi, Clare had been expected to marry into a prominent family, but she was deeply moved by St. Francis's preaching on gospel poverty.

#### SAYING GOODBYE TO HER OLD LIFE OF EASE AND GREAT WEALTH:

On Palm Sunday in 1212, 18-year-old Clare secretly left her family home through the "door of the dead"—a side door used to carry out coffins—symbolizing her death to her former worldly life. She joined Francis and, before the altar, made a solemn vow to live a life of poverty devoted to Christ.

■ TRUSTING IN DIVINE
PROVIDENCE: Clare and her sisters lived a life of extreme material poverty, owning no property and relying entirely on alms. This practice was a profound act of trust in God's care. They were a community of women who lived a simple, austere life, wearing rough clothes, eating no meat, and dedicating themselves to manual labor and prayer. By stripping themselves of worldly

possessions, the Poor Clares identified with the poor and made themselves available to God's will and the needs of others. This brought Clare into closer intimacy with the poor and with Jesus, whose example she longed to emulate.

#### SEEING CHRIST IN HER NEIGHBOR

Clare's understanding of love for neighbor was rooted in her mystical vision of Christ. She taught her sisters that all people are "mirrors of Christ" and "temples of God".

#### ■ REFLECTION OF GOD:

Clare's service was more than charity; it was a calling to see and reflect God's presence in others. She saw a "seed" of divinity in each person and encouraged her sisters to endure life's challenges to bring forth that divine life in one another.

 SERVING WITH HUMILITY: As abbess of her community, Clare modeled this service through

her actions. She would wash and kiss the feet of her sisters who returned sore and weary from begging for food. Her humility demonstrated that no task was too small for someone serving Christ's beloved.

#### **ACTS OF COURAGEOUS COMPASSION AND LOVE** FOR HER NEIGHBOR


Even as a cloistered nun, Clare's love for her neighbor extended beyond the walls of her monastery.

#### DEFENDING ASSISI:

In 1240, Saracen invaders threatened the city of Assisi and the convent of San Damiano. Frail and ill, Clare took the Blessed Sacrament in a monstrance to the gate and prayed for divine protection. The invaders miraculously fled, and the city and convent were spared. This act was a powerful expression of her faith and her deep love for her community.

#### ADVOCATING FOR HER **COMMUNITY:** Clare tenaciously advocated for the strict poverty of her community, successfully appealing to the pope to secure a "privilege of poverty" that protected her order's way of life. Her steadfast determination ensured that her sisters could live out their chosen path of love and service.

#### SHINING AS A BEACON OF **HOPE:** Clare demonstrated unwavering hope even in the face of adversity, which she shared with others through her actions and attitudes. She inspired others to find solace and courage in God's love through her example of faith and generosity.



 FINDING CHRIST IN THE **ORDINARY:** Even when sick and bedridden, she expressed her love in small ways, like sewing altar cloths for churches. For her, every action was an opportunity to show God's love to others.

Through her selfless choices and deep faith, St. Clare demonstrated that loving Jesus in one's neighbor is a call to see God in every person, serving them with compassion and unwavering trust.

#### EMBRACING THE CROSS [1]

As a noblewoman in 13thcentury Assisi, Clare had been expected to marry into a prominent family, but she was


deeply moved by St. Francis's preaching on gospel poverty.

Most of her life, Clare lived with sickness. While she complained little of her own illness, she is known for frequently healing others. She lived an enclosed life within the narrow confines of a small monastery in Assisi. Yet her story is known around the entire world today.

Contemplative living was Clare's reason for living simply. One needs to be poor to have the space to meet God. Clare, by her way of life, witnessed to others the one thing necessary and found herself united with all people in sharing her need

for and reliance on God.

Clare learned that embracing the cross opens one totally to God, who keeps teaching the depths of love. This union with God unites neighbors. Our suffering becomes one with that of others. Together, we learn the compassion and love mirrored by Jesus.

Clare wrote four letters to Agnes of Prague, the queen of Bohemia, who became a Poor Clare. (Clare's sister Agnes is known as Agnes of Assisi.) In her third letter to Agnes, she CLARE LEARNED THAT EMBRACING THE CROSS OPENS ONE TOTALLY TO GOD, WHO KEEPS TEACHING THE DEPTHS OF LOVE. THIS UNION WITH GOD UNITES NEIGHBORS. OUR SUFFERING BECOMES ONE WITH THAT OF OTHERS. TOGETHER, WE LEARN THE COMPASSION AND LOVE MIRRORED BY JESUS.

writes, "The soul of a faithful person is greater than heaven itself, since the heavens and the rest of creation can not contain the creator and only the faithful soul is God's dwelling place and throne.

As the glorious Virgin of Virgins carried Jesus materially, so we too, by following in her footprints, especially those of poverty and humility, can without a doubt, always carry Him spiritually in our chaste and virginal

bodies, holding the one by whom all things are held together, possessing that which in comparison with the other transitory possessions of the world, we will possess more securely."

Taking these words to Agnes seriously would change the way people look at themselves and others. The answer lies within. The realization of this "indwelling of God" calls for a respect and an appreciation for who we are. Clare taught her sisters to see themselves as temples of God, mirrors of Christ and revelations of the Holy Spirit. Such servanthood holds none of the unhealthy implications of being either slaves or doormats.

It calls us to mirror the selfemptying compassion we have seen mirrored in Jesus. It is the same Jesus, as we clearly know, who dwells in our neighbor. Our neighbors are also temples of God, mirrors of Christ and revelations of the Spirit. Our God dwells in each of us and each of us uniquely manifests our God.

Like Mary, we are called to birth our God for one another, to bring to life the reality of God's presence.

#### BEING REFLECTIONS OF GOD FOR ONE ANOTHER

Service goes beyond merely doing for one another. Service, in Clare's view, is a calling to be reflections of God for one another. Within each of us, Clare saw clearly, is a seed that awaits birth. We are encouraged to endure life's labor pangs and bring forth life. Not to do so would be to have the manifestation of God be stillborn.

#### MAKING OUR STRANGER OUR **MUCH-LOVED NEIGHBOR**

Each day, as Franciscans (and all Christians in general), we can grab each golden opportunity that comes



our way to make the stranger our much-loved neighbor. Each day, we can remind ourselves that we have each been stripped of our old clothes and have put on the new clothes of Christ when we made our baptismal vow to respect the individual dignity of every human being. Each day, we can follow Clare's example by making the stranger our neighbor.

# Gathering HIGHLIGHTS



ur Oct. 26 meeting began with a beautiful Franciscan Wake service for our dearly departed sister Gail Halada, OFS.

Prepared and celebrated by our spiritual assistant Fr. Hugh Macsherry, OFM, the service reminded us of Gail's mission and the one that awaits us all. "Death itself marks that sacred moment when this life embraces the next one," Fr. Hugh said in his homily.

"Continue to be Jesus for each other in your daily life. As a fraternity, we want to reveal Christ to each other every day. We give thanks for the way Gail revealed Christ to us. May we continue our missions until Christ comes for us," Fr. Hugh said.

The prayer service was followed by a



presentation and discussion of Rule 7, led by Marianne Norris, OFS. She offered a heartfelt reflection entitled "TURNING

spoke about the daily call to conversion the continual turning of heart and mind toward Christ that lies at the center of Franciscan spirituality.

Having professed in May, Marianne described herself as a "fresh Franciscan," learning to place Jesus more consciously at the forefront of a full and busy life. "There isn't a one-size-fitsall prayer life," she said. "Each of us finds our own rhythm

and relationship with God."

She shared warm memories of growing up in Ohio, just two blocks from St. Patrick's Church, where her aunt, Sr. Charlotte McEvoy, served as school principal. Her mother worked at the convent to help pay tuition, and young Marianne often accompanied her.

"The convent was such a peaceful place," she recalled, "very different from living with seven older siblings! I remember watching the Ursuline Sisters pray the holy hours while walking slowly on the sidewalks outside the school." Those early impressions of prayerful peace, she said, planted seeds that would grow much later through her Secular Franciscan formation.

Only after studying the Rule of the Secular Franciscan Order did Marianne realize that a deep life of prayer and holiness is not reserved for those in religious orders. Each day offers an opportunity for lay people to pray, to listen, and to turn their hearts toward God. She quoted from Article 7 of the Rule:

"United by their vocation as brothers and sisters of penance, and motivated by the dynamic power of the Gospel, let them

conform their thoughts and deeds to those of Christ by means of that radical interior change which the Gospel itself calls 'conversion.' Human frailty makes it necessary that this conversion be carried out daily."

That "radical interior change," Marianne explained, is captured in the Greek word metanoia, meaning a turning of heart and mind toward God. "I was so excited when I learned that word," she said. "It means we are given fresh chances each day to grow closer to Jesus."

Drawing from examples both personal and historical, she reflected on how St. Francis's conversion began during his time of imprisonment after battle, when he questioned the violence of war and began to listen to the Spirit.

Marianne also spoke about a friend, Cliff, who is on death row at Central Prison and has become a companion in faith. "Every night," she said, "he reviews his day and asks God to forgive what he did wrong—and what he failed to see. His example reminds me that conversion begins with honest reflection and the courage to start again."

Marianne emphasized the beauty of the Sacrament of Reconciliation, calling it a true sign of God's mercy. "I'm grateful we now call it reconciliation instead of confession," she said. "It's not about listing sins—it's about renewing our relationship with Jesus." A priest once told her, "It's not about seeing what you've done wrong; it's about seeing what can change so you can draw closer to God."

She encouraged those present to see conversion as a lifelong process rather than a one-time event. "When we allow God's grace to transform us, that grace naturally flows outward to others," she said. "It's not just an inside job."

Marianne also shared how "sneaky Francis" has appeared in her own life-most recently in a book she picked up after her husband's Parkinson's diagnosis. The chapter began with a familiar Franciscan quote:

"Start by doing what's necessary; then do what's possible; and suddenly you are doing the impossible." That, she said, was God's reminder that faith grows strongest in the small daily steps of trust and love.

Music, too, plays a central role in her spirituality. As part of the parish music ministry, she finds deep joy in prayer through song. "Our rehearsals begin and end with prayer," she said. "We don't just perform—we minister. Music helps others encounter God."

In closing, Marianne expressed gratitude for her Secular Franciscan community. "The love and support of my brothers and sisters have been a divine gift," she said. "They help me live the Gospel more fully every day."

She ended with lines from a song called "Instrument" written by choir director Jim Wahl that reflects her heart as a Franciscan:

Jesus, let me be your hands, let me be your touch.

To comfort those in pain, to share the healing of your love.

To listen with my heart before I speak my mind,

To be your instrument of peace.

### Challenged to always keep seeking the voice of God, Jesus and the Holy Spirit

I am originally from upstate New York, having grown up mostly in Clifton Park, near Albany and Saratoga. I have one younger sister but also enjoyed having many extended family members nearby. I longed for a warmer climate, so when I began looking at colleges I set my heart on going to the University of Virginia in Charlottesville. From there I lived a few years in DC, then moved to North Carolina. I had a long stint as a stay-athome mom of four children, but also worked 24 years at Duke, the majority of them in the Department of Economics as the business manager.

#### Tell us a little about your faith and your relationship with God.

I grew up Catholic and although I was not always especially engaged at mass, my faith in God and the power of prayer was strong. My faith grew much deeper during my college years at U.Va., nurtured by the Dominican friars and the University parish's community and also by participating in Encounters with Christ retreats. In becoming a mom in my mid-twenties, I gained a deeper sense of how much God

loves us through my love for my children. After moving to northwest Raleigh and joining St. Francis of Assisi, I read a biography of St. Francis that touched me profoundly. I became an avid reader of books on St. Francis as well as books on contemplative saints. My faith grew stronger and bolder through the practice of centering prayer. My faith (and support from the St. Francis parish community) supported me through a very difficult divorce and transition from stay-at-home parenting to full time work and helped me find the time to get a Master's Degree in Liberal Studies at Duke. I believe that my faith life has become even stronger in my marriage to Dale because in that relationship, I encounter our Lord daily.

#### Why did you feel called to become a Secular Franciscan?

I have had a devotion to St. Francis for over twenty years, but at Ellen Ferrone's kind invitation, I attended a secular meeting last winter and felt very drawn to this community. The peace I felt at that meeting was striking and the time seemed right for me to embrace the opportunity to serve others alongside members of the secular community.



#### What stage are you at in your Franciscan **journey?** (Are you a visitor, orientee, inquirer, candidate or are you already professed and when?)

My husband Dale and I were just last month welcomed as Inquirers into the Secular Franciscan community.

#### What do you feel you gain from being a part of the Secular Franciscan community?

I feel I gain a sense of peace by spending time with members of this community, but also I feel challenged by



> PRESENCE OF GOD - O Holy Spirit, help me to establish my heart in peace.


#### **MEDITATION**

1. A soul who has tasted God, under the influence of the gift of wisdom, looks at the world with the eyes of God, and therefore is able to judge all things "secundum rationes divinae" (St. Thomas II<sup>a</sup> II<sup>ae</sup>, q.45, a.3, ad 3) by divine principles, according to supernatural motives, and not according to limited human reasoning. These are the truly "wise" judgments that we can never formulate without the help of the Holy Spirit. In fact, "the sensual man {the man of the senses and of natural reason] perceiveth not these things that

are of the Spirit of God; for it is foolishness to him, and he cannot understand, because it is spiritually examined. But the spiritual man [the man of faith guided by the Holy Spirit] judgeth all things" (1 Cor **2,14.15**). He judges all things in relation to their supreme Cause, God; therefore, he directs all his acts and orders everything in his life according to God. From this order—the only true order—comes peace, the fruit of the wise direction of the gift of wisdom; hence, the man who habitually lives under the influence of this gift is a peaceful man par excellence. His heart is established in peace, there is no longer anything disordered in it; all his affections and

desires, all his thoughts and acts, are completely ordered according to God, being wholly submitted and conformed to His laws, to His will, to His good pleasure. One who possesses peace, disseminates peace. A peacemaker, in the etymological sense, is one who makes peace, cultivates peace, and spreads it about him. This is why the gift of wisdom corresponds to the beatitude of peace, "Blessed are the peacemakers." Only one who lives under the influence of this gift can truly judge and regulate everything according to God, so that nothing, not even suffering, can disturb his interior peace, for he knows that even

the most painful happenings are permitted and ordered by God for the good of His elect. "To them that love God, all things work together unto good" (Rom 8,28).

In this way the gift of wisdom gives a note of sweetness, not only to our prayer, but also to our practical life: "Under the influence of this gift," says St. Thomas, "what is bitter becomes sweet, and weariness becomes repose" (II<sup>a</sup> II<sup>ae</sup>, q.45, a.3, ad 3).

**2.** The gift of wisdom leads us to peace: the interior peace of the soul who, having tasted God, gives itself to Him without reserve, in complete surrender to His divine will; the serene peace of one who, seeing God in all things, accepts the hardships of life without being disturbed, adoring God's providence in all; finally, it is the social peace of him who, considering all men in relation to God, as His creatures and His children, loves them all and wishes to live in peace with all. The more perfect it becomes, the more will this peace bring us to taste the reward promised by Jesus: "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called the children of God" (Mt 5,9).

All Christians are children of God by grace, but here we are considering the special reward which we might call a superabundance of the grace of adoption, an experience by which the soul not only knows, but even **feels and tastes** that it is a child of God. It is the savory sense of divine filiation which is born in the soul under the influence of the gift of wisdom. "The Spirit Himself giveth testimony to our spirit, that we are the sons of God" (Rom 8,16); these words of St. Paul become a living reality, a delightful experience; the soul feels itself called a child of God, not by men, but by God Himself;

no audible voice speaks to it, but the more it feels drawn by God and enjoys Him in intimate union, so much the more does it feel that He is its Father and that, in very truth, it is His child.

Our God is the God of peace; therefore, it is perfectly right that the peaceful man, he who possesses and diffuses peace, should feel in a very special way that he is God's child. If men generally do not feel themselves to be children of God, it is because they are so little disposed to peace, so ready for disputes, quarrels and war. They talk about peace but do not make peace, for they do not accept the guidance of the Spirit of wisdom. In their ignorance they prefer to be guided by themselves, and as a result they are dominated by pride, self-interest, and cupidity; they live in disorder and they sow disorder around them.

The more our soul becomes firmly established in peace, and the more we become messengers of peace, to that degree will the Holy Spirit infuse into us this delightful sense of our divine sonship, and this will become for us a source of immense happiness, a true prelude of eternal beatitude.

#### COLLOQUY

"O Holy Spirit, give us Your wisdom to teach and guide us and to bring all things back to You, from whom they came. Oh!

if we could really return to You as we came out from You, like waves returning to the ocean whence they came! Oh! If we could only make this complete return to You, we should be in perpetual happiness and perpetual peace! "Your wisdom is the perfection which orders all things in relation to You who are their end. It considers the past, looks at the present, and scans the future always in relation to You. From this orientation, peace, the sweet fruit of wisdom, is born in our hearts. He who possesses this peace is always serene: he is not troubled by the past or the present, and he looks peacefully toward the future, because he knows that everything is permitted and arranged by Your sovereign goodness.

"O eternal Father, give us light to know this peace, the cause of so many blessings, and without which we fall into so many faults and evils!

"Oh! why can I not communicate this peace to every creature? If I were what I should be, I certainly could diffuse it everywhere! O Lord, give me Your peace, the peace of a heart which lives united to You, for of myself I can have no good and without You I cannot have peace" (St. Mary Magdalen dei Pazzi).

"O most benign Jesus, give me above all desires the desire to rest in You, and in You let my heart find peace. You are the true peace of the heart; You are its only refuge; without You all things are difficult and troubled. In this peace, then, that is, in You, the one sovereign eternal Good, c I will sleep and take my rest" (Imit. HI, 15,4).

The Powerful Nine First Fridays Devotion

he "Nine First Fridays" devotion is a Catholic practice of receiving Holy Communion on the first Friday of nine consecutive months, with the intention of making reparation to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. Devotees should also go to confession within the week before or after, and practice a specific mindset of reparation for sins and ingratitude. In return, Jesus made promises to those who complete the devotion, most notably the grace of final repentance.

# ON THE FIRST FRIDAY DURING 9 CONSECUTIVE MONTHS, THE DEVOTION CONSISTS OF:

#### 1. GOING TO CONFESSION:

Go to confession within a week before or after the First Friday.

#### 2. RECEIVING THE SACRAMENT OF HOLY COMMUNION

Receive Holy Communion on the First Friday of each month. By going to Confession prior to receiving Holy Communion you will also ensure that you receive Holy Communion worthily, in a state of grace. This is important.


#### 3. DOING IT CONSECUTIVELY:

The nine Fridays must be consecutive months.

### 4. INTENDING TO MAKE REPARATION & HONORING THE SACRED HEART:

Have the intention of making reparation for the sins and ingratitude of

humanity towards the Sacred Heart of Jesus, and doing this devotion in honor of The Sacred Heart.

NOTE: If you miss doing one of these (Confession, Holy Communion, Reparation & Honor to the Sacred Heart of Jesus) during this period you must start the entire consecutive nine-month series again.

#### MAINTAIN THE PROPER MINDSET

Have no affection for sin, release unforgiveness, and renounce vices. Practice a specific mindset of reparation for sins and ingratitude.

#### PROMISES OF THE FIRST FRIDAY DEVOTION

According to 12 promises made by Jesus to Saint Margaret Mary Alacoque, those who complete the devotion will receive the grace of final repentance, meaning they will die in God's grace without dying under His displeasure or without receiving the sacraments. Other promises include:

The 12 Promises of the Sacred Heart to St. Margaret Mary are as follows:

- I will give them all the graces necessary for their state of life.
- I will give peace in their families.
- I will console them in all their troubles.
- I will be their refuge in life and especially in death.
- I will abundantly bless all their undertakings.
- Sinners shall find in my Heart the source and infinite ocean of mercy.
- Tepid souls shall become fervent.
- Fervent souls shall rise

- I will bless those places wherein the image of my Sacred Heart shall be exposed and venerated.
- I will give to priests the power to touch the most hardened hearts.
- Persons who propagate this devotion shall have their names eternally written in my Heart.
- In the excess of the mercy of my heart, I promise you that my all powerful love will grant to all those who will receive Communion on the First Fridays, for nine consecutive months, the grace of final repentance: they will not die in my displeasure, nor without receiving the sacraments; and my Heart will be their secure refuge in that last hour.

Let us keep the above promises firmly in our minds. Knowing them adds weight to the practice.

There is no reason for the faithful to hesitate or delay this pious practice in the spirit of reparation which the Sacred Heart of Jesus Requests of us.


#### THIS DEVOTION IS SO NECESSARY IN OUR DAYS





people generously and provided them affluently with alms. Although a merchant, he was a very flamboyant squander of wealth. One day when he was in the shop where he was selling cloth, totally absorbed in business of this sort, a poor man came in, begging alms for the love of God. Preoccupied with thoughts of wealth and the care of business, he did not give him alms. Touched by divine grace, he accused himself of great rudeness, saying: "If that poor man had asked something from you for a great count or barren, you would certainly have granted him his request. How much more should you have done this for the King of Kings and the Lord of all!" Because of this incident, he resolved in his heart, from then on, not to deny a request to anyone asking in the name of so great a Lord (*The* Legend of the Three Companions by Julian of Speyer, Chapter 1)





#### **ANOTHER NAME FOR COURTESY** IS POLITENESS

This seems like a virtue often infrequently practiced today. We tend to notice the times when people were discourteous rather than courteous. Why is this? Is our focus on the rudeness we were shown any indication that we ourselves are not courteous? Perhaps we avoid our own conscience by seeking to focus on the faults of others. Courtesy goes beyond holding the door open for an elderly person or a woman. Courtesy involves patience with people who annoy us, take up our time, or ask what seem to be foolish questions. St. Francis realized that he was not being courteous when he refused alms to a poor man when he would have given them to someone of a higher social class. Do we treat

Help me to realize that my lack of courtesy comes from my abundance of pride and self-centeredness. Help me to desire this virtue of courtesy, Lord. Help me to pattern myself after our Blessed Mother, who was courteous to all. Amen."

#### SAINTS WHO **SHOWED GREAT COURTESY**

Many saints displayed great courtesy by treating everyone with respect, kindness, and humility, regardless of their social standing. For these holy individuals, courtesy was not merely a social custom but a spiritual virtue, an expression of genuine charity.

Notable examples of saints who showed great courtesy include:

SAINT FRANCIS DE SALES (1567-1622): Nicknamed the "Gentleman Saint," Francis de Sales was known for his exceptional politeness, gentle spirit, and pastoral care for everyone, from nobility to commoners. When debating with Protestant adversaries, he was praised for never using harsh, arrogant, or humiliating words. His motto was, "You catch more flies with a drop of honey than with a barrel of vinegar".;

SAINT LOUIS IX, KING OF FRANCE (1214-1270): As a king, Louis was known for his profound humility and justice. He regularly served meals to the poor and often invited 13 special guests from among the poor to dine with him daily. He treated everyone with respect, whether they were princes or peasants. When his nobles questioned his service to the poor, he reminded them that he was honoring Christ himself.;

■ SAINT PHILIP NERI (1515–1595): Philip Neri was known for his cheerfulness and affability, a virtue he used to win over souls. He was especially compassionate and courteous to those seeking confession and

spiritual guidance. His friendly and joyful manner allowed him to befriend young people and guide them away from a dissolute life.




