DISCOVERING PERFECT JOY

St. Francis discovers a deep, internal joy that is independent of external circumstances


t. Francis discovered perfect joy not through worldly accomplishments, but by learning to endure suffering, rejection, and contempt with patience, joy, and charity.

He realized that true, "perfect joy" is the ability to accept hardship with a loving and grateful spirit, seeing it as a way to share in Christ's sufferings, and it is a deep, internal joy independent of external circumstances.

THROUGH SUFFERING

Francis taught that perfect joy is not found in miraculous powers, but in the ability to endure suffering with patience. He used the example of being insulted, beaten, and turned away from a town, and having to remain patient, loving, and joyful.

REFLECTION

In Luke 1:28 the angel Gabriel, speaking on God's behalf, addresses Mary as "full of grace" or "highly favored". In that context, this phrase means that Mary is receiving all the special divine help necessary for the task ahead. However, the Church grows in understanding with the help of the Holy Spirit. The Spirit led the Church, especially non-theologians, to the insight that Mary had to be the most perfect work of God next to the Incarnation. Or rather, Mary's intimate association with the Incarnation called for the special involvement of God in Mary's whole life. The logic of piety helped God's people to believe that Mary was full of grace and free of sin from the first moment of her existence. Moreover, this great privilege of Mary is the highlight of all that God has done in Jesus. Rightly understood, the incomparable holiness of Mary shows forth the incomparable goodness of God.

THE CORE OF PERFECT JOY, FOR FRANCIS, WAS THE ABILITY TO GET BEYOND HIS OWN SELF-IMPORTANCE AND ACCEPT HIS "CROSS" OUT OF LOVE FOR GOD.

BY PRIORITIZING GOD

He understood that this joy comes from placing love for God above all else, including possessions and personal comfort. This allowed him to see suffering not as a source of despair, but as a potential for spiritual growth.

BY OVERCOMING THE SELF

The core of perfect joy, for Francis, was the ability to get beyond his own self-importance and accept his "cross" out of love for God. He learned that this inner disposition, which is independent of external success or failure, is what truly matters.

THE STORY OF PERFECT JOY"

Francis's understanding of perfect joy is best illustrated in a famous story he told to his companion, Brother Leo, on a cold, winter journey. He

explained to Brother Leo that even performing great miracles would not be perfect joy. He contrasts external success with the internal joy of patiently enduring hardship, like being kicked out of a town, with love and a joyful spirit. As they walked, shivering in the snow, Francis asked Leo to write down what would not be perfect joy. He systematically listed all the

be perfect joy. He systematically listed all the things the world might value:

 HOLINESS AND SETTING A GOOD EXAMPLE:

Even if a friar gave a great example of holiness to all people, this would not be perfect joy.


■ MIRACLES AND POWER:

Even if they could heal the sick, cast out demons, and raise the dead, this would not be perfect joy.

KNOWLEDGE AND WISDOM:

Even if they knew all languages, all sciences, and could predict the future, this would not be perfect joy.

After listing these and other great achievements, Brother Leo, confused and cold, finally asked, "Father, I pray you in God's name tell me, where is perfect joy?"

Francis then explained that perfect joy would be found in the following scenario:


If they arrived at a friary cold, hungry, and muddy, and the doorkeeper not only refused them entry but called them rascals, beat them, and left them to freeze outside all night, they were to endure all of this with patience, joy, and charity, thinking humbly that the doorkeeper was acting by God's command.

"Write that perfect joy is to be found there!" Francis declared.

THE CORE OF HIS DISCOVERY

For Francis, this scenario represented the ultimate expression of Christian humility and love. By accepting mistreatment and suffering without complaint, and seeing it as an opportunity to share in the sufferings of Christ, one could experience a profound inner peace and security that the world could never provide or take away. It meant letting go of self-importance and relying completely on God's loving care.

Saint Francis thus taught that perfect joy is discovered not in wealth, status, miracles, or any worldly comfort, but in embracing suffering, insults, and humility with patience and a heart full of love for Christ. It is found in a complete surrender to God's will and an imitation of Christ's own suffering.





Gathering HIGHLIGHTS

t our Padre Pio gathering on Sunday, Nov. 23, we were blessed to welcome Consuelo Kwee as our speaker, a woman whose life and ministry embody compassion, accompaniment, and a deep trust in God's call. She is director of Immigration Services for Catholic Charities in Raleigh.

She addressed how her work with the immigrant community has strengthened her faith and how others can provide support in these uncertain times.

Consuelo was born in Mexico City and later moved with her parents and five siblings to Canada. After her marriage, she and her husband settled in



Raleigh in the 1980s. In 1997, she joined Catholic Charities. From the beginning, she felt a strong desire to serve all who came, regardless

of background or faith. Over the years, Consuelo found herself increasingly inspired to walk alongside immigrant and refugee

families during some of the most difficult chapters of their lives. She shared that as they searched for safety, stability, and a better future, she recognized her work as part of God's invitation to accompany His people.

"Helping vulnerable people has made me strong," Consuelo said.

Today, her office serves 54 counties across Eastern and Central North Carolina, processing more than 800 cases each year.

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"CATHOLIC CHARITIES IMMIGRATION SERVICES ASSISTS **WITH VISAS AND OTHER IMMIGRATION NEEDS AND OFFERS COMMUNITY EDUCATION WORKSHOPS TO** HELP CLIENTS PREPARE FOR **CITIZENSHIP** INTERVIEWS. "

Clients arrive from 42 countries, each carrying a unique story of hardship, hope, and perseverance. Catholic Charities Immigration Services assists with visas and other immigration needs and offers community education workshops to help clients prepare for citizenship interviews.

"It's a joy to see someone receive their green card," she said.

Consuelo shared the moving story of a client, a permanent resident since the 1960s and a father of four. Although he had spent decades planting and harvesting strawberries and cucumbers in North Carolina fields, he could not read either English or Spanish. When he came to a workshop seeking help with a naturalization form, Consuelo paired him with a student volunteer to prepare for

the naturalization interview which was scheduled in three months.

Consuelo worried about how he would manage the questions, but he passed every one of them. She later learned that he had been listening to audio recordings of the citizenship questions and answers every day while driving to and from the fields.

"Imagine the joy of hearing that he passed," she said. He took the oath and attended the naturalization ceremony the same day.

Consuelo closed by sharing ways we, as people of faith, can support our immigrant and refugee neighbors:

- Volunteer your time.
- Donate money to support essential services.
- Listen to their stories. Ask them, "Why are you

here?" Understanding is the beginning of compassion.

"This work has given me a connection to my faith, and at the same time it has given others hope," Consuelo said.

Aspirant Doug Thoren, who scheduled the presentation and is a strong advocate for immigrants, also read the Special Message from the United States Conference of Bishops addressing their concerns about the lack of consideration for human dignity in the recent efforts by ICE to detain immigrants.

Afterward, fraternity members used the Conversations in the Spirit method to discuss their thoughts and concerns about today's immigration issues.

"Does life" with Jesus always at her side

In two minutes or less, tell us a little about your background (family, occupation, heritage, etc.).

I was born in northern Minnesota and then moved to Berea, Ohio (a suburb of Cleveland) when I was about 5 years old. I met my husband of 40 years, Mark, while we were both attending Miami University in Oxford, Ohio. We are both from Berea and went to the same high school and I sometimes wonder how many times we passed each other in the hall! I moved to NC in 1983 to attend graduate school at UNC Chapel Hill. Mark and I were married in 1985 and we have two children. Nina (38) and Justin (33). I worked as an audiologist for 40 years before retiring in 2022. I currently work one day a week as a newborn hearing screener in the NICU at Wakemed.

Tell us a little about your faith and your relationship with God.

I was fortunate to be able to attend a Catholic school from 1st to 8th grade and then went to CCD classes during high school where many seeds were planted in my heart that will take a lifetime to grow! My father has been a role model of faith for me so I think he passed that down to me. My relationship with God has been ever evolving and

I find that as I have gotten older, it has become more and more important. I don't know how people can "do life" without Jesus by their side.

Why did you feel called to become a Secular Franciscan?

I have felt a tug in that direction even before I knew anything about Secular Franciscans. It probably started when Mark and I began attending St. Francis of Assisi parish in the late 80s. We felt so welcome here, unlike any other church we had gone to. When I attended a women's retreat at St. Francis Springs a number of years ago I met several very kind and gentle women who said they were secular Franciscans, which was the first time I had heard about them. I tucked that information into the back of my heart and decided I would look into it but it wasn't until last year that I attended a Come and See gathering. I have felt more and more called as I go through formation. My formation sponsor, Ellen, has also been so encouraging when I have had questions or doubts.

What stage are you at in your Franciscan journey?

I recently became in inquirer. It's hard to believe that more than a year has already gone by in my Franciscan journey!

What do you feel you gain from being a part of the Secular Franciscan community?

Following in the footsteps of St. Francis means I am also learning more about the care of all creation. I am less afraid to step beyond my comfort zone when I have the support of so many brothers and sisters.

Without Holy Communion, there is a partial indulgence of 300 days for saying the prayer. The indulgence is granted for praying the prayer after receiving Communion.

Union God with

PRESENCE OF GOD - My God, Thou hast created me for Thyself; grant that I may return to Thee and unite myself to Thee by love.

MEDITATION

1. The whole life of man is a return journey to God: he came from God and must go back to Him. The more complete this return, the more intimate his union with God will become and the better will he have attained the end for which he was created: he will be perfect and eternally happy. St. Thomas teaches that a being is perfect when it attains its end; thus the perfection of

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man consists in rejoining God and uniting himself to Him, his last end. Man finds in union with God all that he can desire: he finds his peace, the assuaging of his hunger for the infinite, of his thirst for love and imperishable felicity. "Thou hast made us for Thyself, O Lord, and our heart is restless until it rests in Thee" (St. Augustine). Man finds his eternal happiness in union with God; and the life of heaven is nothing else than this union carried to its ultimate perfection, wherein man gives God the greatest glory and the greatest love which, in turn, redounds to man's own eternal beatitude.

The soul that truly loves God does not resign itself to waiting for heaven in order to be united THE SOUL THAT

to Him, but desires ardently to anticipate this union here below. Is this possible? Yes, Jesus has said so: "If anyone love Me, he will keep My word, and My Father will love him; and We will come to him and will make Our abode with him" (Jn 14,23). Our Lord Himself tells us in these words the condition for living united to Him: love. "He that abideth in charity, abideth in God, and God in *him*" (1 Jn 4,16). Love is the great power which unites us to God even in this life, where, imprisoned in matter, we cannot yet enjoy the direct contact. the face to face vision of Him.

"The end of the spiritual life,"

says St. Thomas, "is that man unite himself to God by love" (II@ *He*, *q*.44, *a*.1, *co*.). By steps of love, gressibus amoris, we advance toward our last end: union with God. Such is the great ideal which should illumine and direct our whole life, the great goal which, with the divine assistance, we can attain even here below, as far as is possible in our state as pilgrims.

2. St. John of the Cross explains wherein union of love with God consists. It is not a question of the substantial union which always exists between God and everything created and by means of which He is preserving their being. That kind of union is natural and can never be jacking in any creature, not even in the greatest sinner. The union of love, however, is supernatural and only takes place in souls "when there is produced that likeness that comes from love," that is, in souls that are in the state of grace. The Saint says: "Although...God is ever in the soul, giving it, and through His presence conserving within it, its natural being, yet He does not always communicate supernatural being to it. For this is communicated only by love and grace, which not all souls possess; and all those that possess it have it not in the same degree; for some have attained more degrees of love and others fewer." He concludes: "God communicates Himself most to that soul that has progressed farthest in love" (AS II, 5,3.4).

The state of grace is the point of departure for the union of love with God. The goal is the full development: of grace, so that the soul remains totally supernaturalized, and all its powers, its entire will, all its affections are concentrated in God, neither desiring nor loving anything henceforth but what

God wills and loves. Grace is the life of God in us, a life which develops through progress in love. The more the soul loves, the more grace increases in it, with the result that its participation in the divine life becomes more profound, leading it to an ever more intense and perfect union with God. Grace and love are the precious seeds of union with God; they put the soul in intimate communion with Him: communion of life, of thought and of will.

God always remains God, distinct from His creature; the creature always keeps its own personality, and yet the soul becomes so permeated with divine life, God so "communicates to it His own supernatural Being that it seems to be God... rather than a soul" (ibid., 7).

Such is the ultimate end of union with God upon earth, a sublime end, but one which it is not rash to desire, since each of us has already received in baptismal grace the seed of union with God.

COLLOQUY

"O Jesus, who will give me the grace to form one only spirit with You? Rejecting the multiplicity of creatures, I desire indeed, O Lord, Your unity alone! O God, You are the only One, the sole unity necessary for my soul!

Ah! dear friend of my heart,

unite this poor soul of mine to Your singular goodness! You are entirely mine, when shall I be all Yours? The magnet draws iron and holds it fast to itself; Lord Jesus, my Beloved, be the magnet of my heart: draw, hold fast, unite forever my spirit to Your paternal heart! Oh, since I was made for You, how is it that I am not in You? Submerge this drop, which is the spirit You have given me, in the sea of Your goodness, from which it proceeds. Lord, seeing that Your heart loves me, why do You not lift me up to You, as I so much desire? Draw me, and I will run in the odor of Your ointments until I cast myself into Your arms and never move from thence forever. Amen" (St. Francis de Sales).

"O Lord, who could describe how great a gain it is to cast ourselves into Yours arms and make an agreement with You: You will take care of my affairs and I of Yours. "For what am I, Lord, without You? What am I worth if I am not near You? If once I stray from Your Majesty, be it ever so little, where shall I find myself?

"O my Lord, my Mercy and my Good! What more do I want in this life than to be so near You that there is no division between You and me?

"O Lord of my life, draw me to Yourself, but do it in such a way that my will may ever remain so united to You that it shall be unable to leave You" (T.J. Con, 4-3).

The Great Importance of Mary

onsecrating yourself to Mary is an act of entrusting yourself to her as a spiritual mother to help you grow in holiness and draw closer to Jesus. You are entrusting yourself entirely to the special maternal care and intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mary to be led closer to Her Son Jesus Christ. It is seen as a way to have her quide your life, make your prayers and good works more perfect by presenting them to Jesus, and receiving her spiritual protection and guidance. It is considered to be the highest form of Marian devotion, an act of "total gift of ourselves". Ultimately, the consecration is made to God, with Mary as the intercessor who leads you to Him.

To Jesus, through Mary

CONSECRATION TO JESUS THROUGH MARY

Consecration to Jesus through
Mary is a formal act of trust in Mary
as intercessor, entrusting yourself to
her, placing yourself under her protection,
surrendering yourself and your spiritual
life to her, accepting her as your mother
and allowing her to guide you. This true
devotion to Mary consists in giving yourself
entirely to Mary in order to belong
entirely to Jesus through her.
The consecration/entrustment
to Mary begins with a period

of prayerful preparation, most often 33 days, followed by a formal act of consecration. The preparation typically involves reflection on your own self, Mary, and Jesus Christ, often following a structured method like the Montfort Way.

WHY DO WE CONSECRATE **OURSELVES TO MARY?** WHY IS IT SO IMPORTANT?

KEY REASONS FOR CONSECRATION:

- IMITATING JESUS: Jesus came to humanity through Mary during the Incarnation, and by consecrating yourself to her, you are seeking to return to Jesus through the same path He chose...His own mother. Because of her unique relationship with Jesus, she is closest to Him and is thus uniquely positioned to help you grow in intimacy with Him.
- **OBEYING JESUS' COMMAND:** From the Cross, Jesus gave Mary to the disciple John, saying, "Behold your mother" (John 19:27), which is interpreted as Christ entrusting every Christian to Mary's maternal care. Consecration is a fulfillment of this command.
- A SURE AND QUICK PATH TO HOLINESS. TREMENDOUS SPIRITUAL GROWTH: Many saints and popes, including St. Louis de Montfort and St. Pope John Paul II, taught that entrustment to Mary is an effective and powerful method for aligning your will with the will of God and growing in sanctity. Consecration to Mary, as described by St. Louis de Montfort, is considered the shortcut to heaven.

- A MODEL OF CHRIST: Mary is seen as the ultimate role model of faith, hope, and love for her role in the life of Jesus, as His mother.
- A DEEPENED RELATIONSHIP WITH JESUS: The goal is never to place Mary above God, but rather to allow her to guide and form you into "another Christ". The closer you gets to Mary, the closer you get to her Son, as their hearts are inseparable. Mary will •always• take you straight to Jesus.

HOW TO CONSECRATE YOURSELF TO MARY

The most common approach involves a 33-day period of spiritual preparation, culminating in a formal Act of Consecration, often on a specific, significant Marian feast day, and striving to live out the commitment to Mary's guidance in one's daily life.

PREPARATION

A period of prayerful preparation, commonly 33 days, using guided materials such as 33 Days to Morning Glory by Fr. Michael Gaitley or the traditional methods of St. Louis de Montfort. This is required to prepare yourself for the act of consecration. This can be done individually or with a group.

PREPARATION METHODS

ST. LOUIS DE MONTFORT'S **WAY:** Saint Louis dedicated his life to following and praying to the Virgin Mary and the traditional, original method for consecration is outlined in his book "True Devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary," one of the greatest books of Marian spirituality ever written. It involves specific daily prayers and readings over 33 days focused on renunciation of the world, knowledge of self, knowledge of Mary, and knowledge of Jesus. In "True Devotion to Mary," St. Louis de Montfort teaches the easiest, most secure, and



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most perfect way to sainthood. According to St. Louis, there is no better way to become holy quickly, to please God, and to guarantee your eternal salvation than being truly devoted to Mary, the Mother of God. The original source of the beautiful phrase "to Jesus through Mary" comes from this book, in which St. Louis sums up all of Christian life. Through his wisdom and love of the Blessed Virgin, he describes the path to holiness and helps us to learn the lessons that have saved countless souls. In a simple but profound way, St. Louis reveals all the spiritual benefits of true devotion to Mary. The book "Preparation for Total Consecration according to Saint Louis Marie de Montfort" was inspired by Louis de Montfort and published in 2001 and provides a very easy, outlined method for the preparation for consecration, precisely specifying which chapters are to be read from "True Devotion to Mary" and which prayers are to be prayed each day. His method, and accompanying daily preparation prayers and readings, is also easily outlined at https://www.fisheaters.com/ totalconsecrationmontfort.html

FATHER MICHAEL GAITLEY'S APPROACH: A more modern, popular synthesis in his book "33 Days to Morning Glory," which streamlines the process and draws on the teachings of St. Louis de Montfort, St. Maximilian Kolbe, St. Teresa of Calcutta, and St. Pope John Paul II. This is also a very beautiful and easy-to-follow approach.



 ST. MAXIMILLIAN KOLBE'S METHOD: Focuses on the Immaculate Conception and aligning one's will with the will of God through total entrustment

to Mary, often involving enrollment in the Militia Immaculata movement and wearing the Miraculous Medal.

CONSECRATION *************

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STEPS ON THE DAY OF CONSECRATION

- RECEIVE THE SACRAMENT
 OF RECONCILIATION:
 Receive the Sacrament of
 Reconciliation (Confession)
 on the day of Consecration,
 if possible. If it is not possible
 to go to Confession on the
 day of Consecration than
 it is highly recommended
 to go within the week
 leading up to it.
- ATTEND MASS AND RECEIVE HOLY COMMUNION: By going to Confession prior to receiving Holy Communion you will also ensure that you receive Holy Communion worthily, in a state of grace. This is important.
- MAKE THE FORMAL ACT OF CONSECRATION: Recite the formal Act of Consecration prayer, most often after Holy Communion, and sign a written copy as a formal commitment, thus formally offering yourself to Mary.

AFTER CONSECRATION, LIVING THE CONSECRATION

Consecration is a lifelong commitment, not a one-time event, and requires annual renewal.

Once you have consecrated yourself to Jesus through Mary, live that consecration. St. Louis-Marie de Montfort recommended the following^[1]:

- KEEP PRAYING AND MAKE PRAYER A PRIORITY:
 Keep praying to develop a "great contempt" for the spirit of this world
- MEDITATE OFTEN ON THE MYSTERY OF THE INCARNATION: Maintain a special devotion to the Mystery of the Incarnation (e.g., through meditation;

- spiritual reading; focusing on Feasts centering around the Incarnation, such as the Annunciation and the Nativity, etc.)
- DAILY ROSARY!: Pray the Rosary daily. Frequently recite the Ave, and the Magnificat.
- THE LITTLE CROWN OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN: Recite, every day if it is not inconvenient, the "Little Crown of the Blessed Virgin." This is a series of Paters, Aves, and Glorias, one Ave for each star in the Virgin's Crown. St. Louis has a special way of praying the Little Crown, which is recommended.
- BROWN SCAPULAR: Wearing a Brown Scapular or Miraculous Medal as a sign of dedication.
- THROUGH, WITH, IN AND FOR MARY, FOR THE SAKE OF JESUS: Perform actions "through, with, in and for Mary". Do everything through, with, in and for Mary for the sake of Jesus, with the prayer, "I am all thine Immaculate One, with all that I have: in time and in eternity" in your heart and on your lip.s
- ASK FOR MARY'S ASSISTANCE TO FOLLOW GOD'S WILL: Strive to follow God's will with Mary's help.
- TRUST IN MARY'S CARE & INTERCESSION: Maintain a persistent spirit of trust and devotion to Mary's care and intercession.
- BROWN SCAPULAR: Associate yourself with Mary in a special way before, during, and after Communion. See supplement of the book, "True Devotion to Mary," also available to read online at https://www.fisheaters.com/totalconsecrationbook9.html

CONSECRATION CHAIN:

Wear a little iron chain (around the neck, arm, waist, or The Consecration Chain's a teminger ankle) as an outward sign and reminder of holy slavery. This practice is optional, but very recommended by St. Louis. The appearance of this chain is not further specified, but they can be purchased (search for "consecration chain") or homemade.

 RENEW YOUR CONSECRATION TO MARY:

Renew the consecration once a year on the same date chosen above, and by following the same 33-day period of exercises. If desired, also renew the consecration daily (preferably) or at the very least weekly or monthly with the prayer, "I am all thine and all I have is thine, O dear Jesus, through Mary, Thy holy Mother" or a personal prayer of your own.

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RENEWING THE CONSECRATION


It is highly recommended and best practice to annually renew this preparation and consecration to Mary. My personal opinion is to alternate between the different methods because they are each so beautiful. By this, I mean to follow the De Montfort method one year using St. Louis's "Preparation for Total Consecration according to Saint Louis Marie de Montfort" book and then Father Michael Gaitley's method the next, using this "33 Days to Morning Glory," book/approach the next year. I first started with the traditional method by St. Louis de Montfort, and because of this I read the very beautiful book "True Devotion to Mary" which helped me to immediately draw closer to her, and understand the need for our great devotion to her, especially how she will always, and immediately, take us straight to Jesus and help us to become closer to Him. I thus understood how the closer we draw to Mary, the closer we *automatically* draw closer to Jesus. I would not have read this book otherwise. "True Devotion to Mary" is a tremendous jewel in our spiritual life that we should try to make a priority to read, and not only once

but several times over. As mentioned above, St. Louis's method, and accompanying daily preparation prayers and readings, including the full content of his book "True Devotion to Mary," are available to read (and downloadable) at https://www.fisheaters.com/totalconsecrationmontfort.html

REGARDING **DETACHMENT...**

SCRIPTURE: "Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or what you will drink, or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothing?" (Matthew 6:25)

WRITINGS OF ST. FRANCIS

I did "not come to be ministered unto, but to minister," says the Lord. Let those who are set above others glory in this superiority only as much as if they had been deputed to wash the feet of the brothers; and if they are more perturbed by the loss of their superiorship than they would be by losing the office of washing feet, so much the more do they lay up treasures to the peril of their own soul. (Admonition 4)

INCIDENT FROM THE LIFE OF SAINT FRANCIS

One of the brothers, a spiritual man, to whom blessed Francis was very close, was staying in a hermitage. Considering that if blessed Francis came there at some time he would not have a suitable place to stay, he had

a little cell built in a remote place near the place of the brothers, where blessed Francis could pray when he came. After a few days, it happened that blessed Francis came. When the brother led him to see it, blessed Francis said to him: "This little cell seems too beautiful to me. But if you want me to stay in it for a few days, have it covered inside and out with ferns and tree branches."

That little cell was not made

of stonework but of wood, but because the wood was planed, made with hatchet and ax, it seemed too beautiful to blessed Francis. The brother immediately had it changed as blessed Francis had requested.

For the more the houses and cells of the brothers were poor and religious, the more willingly he would see them and sometimes be received as a guest there. As he stayed and prayed in it for a few days, one day, outside the little cell near the place of the brothers, a brother who was at that place came to where blessed Francis was staying. Blessed Francis said to him: "Where are you coming from, brother?" He told bim: "I am coming from your little cell." "Because you said it is mine," blessed Francis said, "someone else will stay in it from now on: I will not." (The Assisi Compilation, Section 57)

DETACHMENT MAY BE CALLED THE VIRTUE OF AN "OPEN HAND"

DETACHMENT is A virtue which allows us to enjoy the good things of life without being upset if we lose them. We might call detachment the "virtue of the open hand." We need to hold everything loosely so that, should we lose something or someone, we are willing to let it go. Detachment goes beyond getting upset when someone breaks our favorite vase. People who possess the virtue of detachment can love other people dearly. They pray for them intensely. The hurts of others become their own pain, because of their compassion. The joys of others exhilarate them with happiness. Detachment does not mean caring less about others. It means caring

about them in view of God's eternal plan for their lives.

People who approach life with detachment may deeply appreciate the possessions, abilities, and resources which they have. They enjoy life and live it to the full. However, they additionally possess a peace that permits them to endure loss or damage to anything or anyone without losing faith in God or losing hope in the future. God asks that we be attached to only God Himself. He is the unchanging eternal Love.

YOUR PERSONAL EXERCISE:

- **†** Spend a minimum of five minutes meditating on the Virtue of **Detachment**. Do not write anything during this time. Merely begin your time by praying, "Lord, help me to understand the Virtue of Detachment and where I need it in my life."
- † At the end of your meditation time, ask yourself: What am I attached to in my life? What would devastate me if it were lost or damaged? How do I feel about the significant people in my life? How does detachment fit in with love? Do I feel that detachment is important? What is frightening about detachment? What can I do to foster detachment in myself? Should I do this?
- † Find another section in Scripture which illustrates the Virtue of Detachment.

- † Find a statement of Jesus or an incident in His life that deals with the Virtue of Courtesy. Write these into your journal.
- † If you are a member of a Religious Order, find one place in your Rule or Constitutions which calls for the Virtue of Detachment. Explain why you chose this section.
- † Practice the Virtue of Detachment this week. You might select one thing or way of doing things that you are attached to and work on being more detached from it. Record in your journal any memorable insights or happenings.
- † Each evening, examine the day for the opportunities you had to show detachment. Pray, "Lord, I am too attached to (name what you are attached to). I need to be more detached from this. Please help me to hold this with a light touch and to realize that my life will not crumble if this is damaged or removed. Help me to understand that I should be only attached to You, Lord, and that You have power over everything in my life. Help me to give my life and all that I have to You. Amen."
- **†** At the end of the week, record in your journal what you have learned from this exercise.


SAINTS WELL-KNOWN FOR DETACHMENT

any saints are well known for demonstrating detachment and displaying complete surrender to God's Will, as a part of their spiritual growth and union with God. Notable examples of saints who showed detachment include:

- SAINT TERESA OF AVILA: Another influential figure who wrote about detachment as a crucial part of spiritual growth.;

- SAINT CHARBEL: His "Suscipe" prayer is a wellknowExemplified detachment through his simple lifestyle.



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

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
